

It is felt that the territory would be more compact, and that if the salary limit is rigidly enforced in all the cities, there is no reason why the league could not be successful. High salaries are the rock on which most Maine teams have broken hitherto."

Omaha Lays Claim to a Real Fighting Dane in Kid Jensen. Talk about your fighting Danes, why, Hastings Nelson is not the only one who can boast of being durable and all that! There is a young Dane living in Omaha, Neb., who has never been able to break into the record books and who is little known outside of his own state and Colorado, but who is a fighter. The lad's name is Emil (Kid) Jensen, and he has developed from feather weight into a light weight during the last few years, and is now challenging the best 133 pounders in the west.
