The proposal to construct a sea level
ship canal across Scotland again is re-
ceiving serious consideration.
A megaphone and fan have been com-
bined in a recent novelty.

Gold production in the Philippines in-
creased from \$189,958 in 1911 to \$750,
212 in 1912, and is expected to be three
or four times that amount this year.

Everyone has heard of the profes-
sional applauder or "claque" who used to
be employed in all French theatres, es-
pecially on a first night. Some seven or
eight years ago M. Jules Ledoux, a
claque organizer, died leaving a quarter
of a million francs.

Some thirty years ago a young Eng-
lish railway engineer, a very wild youth,
drifted out to India. He fell in love
with a native woman, married her, and
settled down in a native house at Nyree,
near Allahabad.

His wife came of a family who were
hereditary brick-makers. She managed
to interest him in the work, and told
him secrets unknown to most white
men. He went into the business and
prospered so greatly that at his death a
few years ago, a niece in England in-
herited £40,000.

There is a man living in London to-
day who has made a quarter of a mil-
lion by backing race-horses, another
whose income of £20,000 a year arises
from the manufacture of pills, while a
third, who lives at the rate of at least
£5,000 a year, is a man of humble par-
tance whose wealth has accrued en-
tirely from the manufacture of a par-
ticular brand of sausage.

One of the mounted police is report-
ed to have returned to the Chippeway
station some months ago with the in-
formation that east of the Hay River,
and 600 miles from civilization, he had
discovered a band of Indians who had
breweries, and were making "fire wa-
ter" for the Indians, and they were
making "brew" of potatoes, hops,
sugar and yeast, which, when allowed
to ferment, was strong enough to cause
intoxication. During the warm summer
months the Indians raised potatoes for
this brew, but in scarcely any instance
can they be persuaded to grow anything
for food.
