

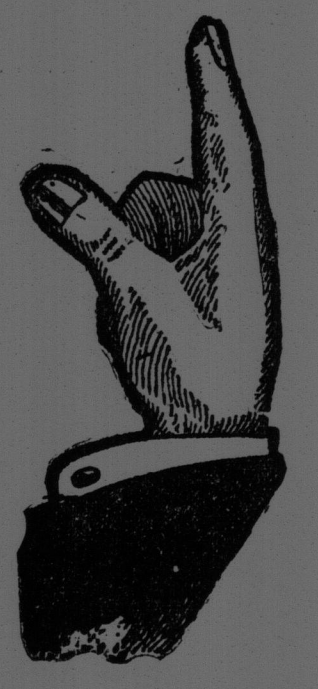
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TEMPERANCE MANIFESTO IS ISSUED

Official Appeal for Election of J. W. Keirstead—Three Meetings of Interest Tomorrow

The following appeal to the electors was issued yesterday by the St. John Temperance Confederation:
"To the temperance people of the City of St. John:
"An appeal is made to you to support J. W. Keirstead, in the election on June 20, the candidate who has pledged himself to the support of prohibition and is endorsed by the St. John County Temperance Federation.
"The movement by which the candidate is endorsed is non-partisan, and already life-long party followers have evidenced their intention to support the prohibition candidate. The movement has the endorsement of temperance lodges, the Evangelical Alliance, and other organizations.
"We appeal to you on this occasion to place moral principle above mere party interest.
"Strong representations for a provincial prohibition measure, which have been made to governments in power have been repeatedly met with refusal; in a recent case not even the courtesy of an official reply given.
"Will you not show by your vote that you resent the attitude and will send to the legislature a representative pledged to prohibition.
"If the temperance people of the city rally their forces and elect one man on a straight prohibition issue, any government in power must be forced to recognize the significance of such a result, and the temperance vote will in future be so respected that prohibition will become a once and for all issue. The eyes of the province are turned to St. John and the result will be far-reaching in its effect upon the temperance movement in the future.
"It is clear to everyone that the candidate who pledges himself in this election will lose at once the vote of every elector who is allied with the liquor interests. Is not this in itself a challenge to every right-thinking citizen. Shall it be said that those who represent the cursed traffic stand loyally together, whilst those who stand for the highest and best principles in a community allow minor principles to outweigh those moral considerations which to a good citizen should always predominate?
"We, therefore, appeal to every right-thinking citizen to give such support to the prohibition candidate, that our city may have the distinct record that when a moral issue is at stake there is always triumph with honor.
"Vote for J. W. Keirstead."

It is understood that some reckless statements made recently by government campaign speakers, notably Hon. Robert Maxwell, will receive attention at these meetings, and that the government's whole record in relation to the temperance cause will be dissected.

CONSERVATIVES IN THE CITY LOSE HEART

Liberal Victory Daily More Certain — Maxwell's Attack on Temperance Men — The Standard Again

The most notable feature of the local political situation is the fact that Conservatives have lost much of their confidence and are now willing to concede the defeat of one or more members of their city ticket. Before the campaign was opened, the nomination made the Tories were very confident of their grip on the city voters, but their time has changed to a great extent since they have begun to gauge the feeling of the people against the reckless and imprudent Fleming government and to note the lack of enthusiasm with which their ticket has been greeted.
On the other hand, the Liberals are united and confident and with Messrs. Foster, Keirstead, Mahoney and Knowlton as their standard bearers, they are counting on a great victory on June 20. The Conservative meetings have been very thinly attended, while it was quite noticeable that many of the strong men of the party were conspicuous by their absence at last night's meeting at the Opera House.
The ward workers are now getting things in shape at the headquarters for each ward and a splendid spirit of hopefulness and enthusiasm prevails. An enthusiastic meeting of the Liberal workers in Prince ward took place last evening and the officers were elected as follows: H. M. Coates, president; M. J. Nugent, vice-president; Hugh Beck, Thomas Tracy, John Jenkins and John Connelan, district chairmen; D. J. Britt, secretary.
A Liberal meeting is to be held to-night at Dipper Harbor to be held by the candidates and James Lowell. On Monday night the Liberals of Fairville are to meet for organization at Marshall's hall.
At the Opera House last night Hon. J. D. Hazen, minister of marine, and Hon. Robert Maxwell delivered addresses in support of the Conservative candidates for the city and county. Dr. Thomas Walker occupied the chair and on the platform besides the candidates were several party stalwarts. Members of the Board of Health were distributed throughout the hall to start the applause. The audience was small, the house not being half filled, and there was no great enthusiasm and during the early proceedings the singing that accompanied the candidates was not very warm, a fact that was apparently noted from the platform where a great effort was made to improve matters. The speech was simply a rebuke of the North End. He recited former charges against Hon. Dr. Pugsley, Mr. Copp and other Liberals. The outstanding feature of his address was a vicious attack on the temperance federation for endorsing J. W. Keirstead.
Mr. Hazen while starting out with the announcement that he was not to deal with federal issues, was soon knee deep in them. He was not modest in his reference to the Valley railway, and claimed credit for most of the good things that have happened to the province in recent years.
He closed his address with a direct appeal to the Conservative party to rally to the support of Fleming and his candidates, "so that on the 20th we can celebrate a victory, as only the Conservative party know how."
Hugh Campbell, of the North End, whose ability as an entertainer is so well known, asked The Telegraph last night to deny emphatically that he sang at the Board Club smoker, as stated by the Standard yesterday. Campbell, who has always been a staunch Liberal, was not at the smoker and had no connection with the programme. "It is a sample of the truthfulness of the Standard's police reports," Mr. Campbell said, "no wonder its complaint so much about the way it is run."

BIG LIQUOR SEIZURE IN KENT COUNTY HOTELS

Richibucto, N. B., June 7.—As the result of a raid made on three hotels here, the Queen, Union and New Kent, twelve loads of liquor, including upwards of 3,000 bottles of beer, were seized. The raid was made by George M. Clarke, liquor license inspector, who had with him Constable A. E. Fraser, Rev. W. R. Robinson, of St. John, secretary of the law enforcement committee of the Sons of Temperance, and Rev. R. H. Staver, grand worthy patriarch of the Sons of Temperance.
The liquor consisted of whiskey, brandy, ale, porter, stout, champagne, gin, lager beer, port wine and sherry wine. The large quantity of wet goods was taken to Magistrate Davis' and locked up.
It was found concealed in various places, under bar, in simple rooms, in the dining room, in cellars, under wood in wood sheds, under stairways and covered by old clothes, under wraps and under hay.
Three barrels of ale were marked green, three barrels of ale were marked red and one barrel of brandy was marked blue.
In all there were upwards of 3,000 bottles of liquor seized, besides what was found in casks, barrels and jugs.

STOLE HER SACHEL; Paris Police Track The Thief and Get Money Back

HUNCHBACK'S CRIME
Teased Too Much, he Slays His Tormentor—A Mystery of the River Seine—Interesting News of France in Letter to The Times
(Times Special Correspondence)
Paris, May 28.—When Madame de Rouvray, a wealthy lady, residing in the Rue de Valenciennes, arrived from Vichy at the Gare de Lyon, she thought that she might as well lunch there as anywhere else, so, committing her light luggage to the care of a porter, she proceeded to the buffet. While she had finished her meal she went in, quick of her property, to find, to her dismay, that it had disappeared. The loss was all the more annoying as among the bags was one containing as much as \$500 worth of scrip, besides several hundred francs in gold.
The police, on being informed of this misadventure, were so fortunate as to ascertain that a man, known as a hunchback, who had been linking in the neighborhood of the bridge in question, had gone off in a cab to the Gare d'Est. Taking an automobile, he sped off to the Gare d'Est, which he reached in time to arrest the woman, who was on the point of leaving, in company of two men, with the stolen baggage.
The police are endeavoring to discover the identity of the trio, as they obstinately decline to give any account of themselves. Everyone is agreed that these railway stations are haunted by thieves, who lay their hands on any light baggage that may be left unattended; but this was a more than ordinarily serious case, as all the baggage had been appropriated.
Murder Cases
A crime has been committed at Boismoutier, in the Seine-et-Oise, by an individual named, who, because a man had called him names, strangled him on the highway during the night, smashed his skull, and dragged his corpse some 1,800 feet to a ditch. The hunchback, a man named Danny, was known in the country as very tough, and his infamy was mentioned, but he was otherwise of a quiet disposition. One Perthus, a week, and the two had a drink together in the evening.
The newcomer, perhaps not knowing the extreme irascibility of his companion, on one point, crossed about his hump, many, became excited, and, having made it up with his companion, they again drank together, and afterwards reached a place a little distance from the farm on which both were working, another being probably asleep. At any rate, Perthus was killed, and his corpse was dragged to a ditch near the farm, and thrown away. The following morning, while the men were taking their coffee on the farm, the hunchback said to the farmer, "There was a corpse in the ditch, and he had seen the feet of a man sticking out above the surface of the water. It was the corpse of Perthus."
The farmer, suspecting a crime, closely questioned the hunchback, who admitted that it was he who killed his companion. He only remembered that he had got into a quarrel again on the high road, and that he had taken Perthus by the throat, and what happened afterwards he could not tell. The body showed signs of strangulation, and the skull had been smashed in. The hunchback, after he had told his story, tried to run away, but he was overtaken and arrested by a policeman in plain clothes, who happened to be near by, and who was informed by the farmer of the crime.
Mystery surrounds the finding of a cab and a drowned man in the Seine at Levallois-Perret. A woman on a barge saw something like a dead animal and a carriage, and called the attention of the police to her discovery. The dead animal, when raised to the surface, turned out to be a horse hitched to a cab of the Compagnie Urbaine. Both were fished out of the river.
But the case then was as to what had become of the cabman. Inquiry at the offices of the company showed that the man had been seen by a woman named Debeaux, and he has not since been heard of. 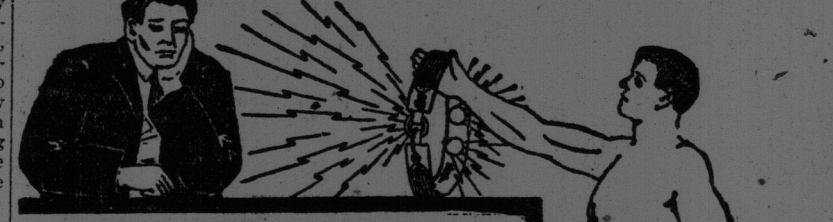
STANDARD MAN BREAKS UP FLEMING RALLY; TROUBLES FROM STAGE

Moncton, N. B., June 7.—The Transcript today says:
"Hon. Premier Fleming was advertised to speak in one of R. C. Tait's potato warehouses (Rhedias) last night. The notice calling the meeting made special reference to the fact that reserved seats would be provided for ladies, and ladies in large numbers took advantage of that offer.
"No one tearing the notice could have had any idea that the Hon. Premier was an average size of 100 pounds a day, leading a comic opera or an acrobatic performance, but such this meeting turned out to be. The chief acrobat was no less a person than the premier's attendant or personal scribe for the St. John Standard. At a certain point in the proceedings he took a high dive, and falling from the stage landed head first in the midst of the Artisan band, which had been engaged for the occasion. Women shrieked and children called for their parents. The reporter's eyeglasses were gone and his face was considerably discolored.
"The premier, noticing the ominous event, muttered a few closing remarks, and the curtain rang down and the lights were put out. Many of the Tories here are quite superstitious, and they look upon the incident as a very foreboding omen for Fleming."
