NEWSPAPERS IN JAPAN

There are more than 1800 newspapers and magazines in Japan. Every town of 10,000 or more has one newspaper and usually two or more.

The leading Tokyo daily "Asahi" has a circulation of 180,000 copies; the "Yomiuri" and the "Mainichi" of Osaka, "Chunichi" of Nagoya, and "Yokohama" of Yokohama, all have circulations of 100,000.

Journalism in Japan is nearly 300 years old, but the publication of newspapers there as a distinct enterprise is comparatively recent. Until after the middle of the 19th century news sheets as were published were somewhat of the nature of bulletins roughly printed from wooden blocks and issued at irregular times by anyone who saw fit to have them prepared.

The first of the great dailies of later times was the Yokohama Mainichi, Shimizu, which made its first appearance about 40 years ago. It was afterwards moved to Tokyo, where it is still published.

CLOSING EVENTS OF CORONATION DAY IN ST. JOHN.

The Fireworks and Firemen's Parade Watched by Great Crowds—Prize-Winners in The Afternoon Procession

Coronation Day in St. John closed with a big torchlight procession last night followed by a display of fireworks. The streets were even more crowded than during the morning and afternoon. Long before dark people gathered along the route of the parade, and as the hour approached for the start, 9 o'clock, the principal streets presented a swaying mass of humanity.

Chief Kerr led the parade in his carriage and was followed by the Artillery Band. Then came No. 1 salvage corps, under Captain Fred Shaw, and these men walked well. Captain Turner followed with No. 2 salvage corps, who also came in for their share of applause. Then came No. 1 hose company, followed by the engine. The departments from the city proper were commanded by District Engineers Blake and Jackson. It took four horses to haul No. 2 engine and three fine animals were much admired. Next in line was chemical engine No. 1, looking highly polished and followed by No. 3 engine, also taking four horses. After No. 1 book and ladder came No. 4 engine with a splendid pair of greys which took the eye of the crowd. The Carleton Cornet Band appeared next, it being their third parade for the day, but they marched as well as ever. District Engineer Chas. F. Brown led the North End division, in order, No. 5 hose company and engine, No. 2 book and ladder and chemical No. 2, also a handsome piece of apparatus.

The Grand band headed the West End firemen, and No. 7 Company had their new wagon, the latest addition to the department. This was followed by the old hand engine of 1883, decorated and bearing the legend "Auld Lang Syne." No. 6 Company brought up the rear. After the parade the firemen and members of the Salvage Corps assembled in their rooms and music and speeches were enjoyed. At 10 o'clock there was a gathering of members of the various companies at No. 3 station and Mayor and Village Engineer Jones, Green and Wigmore paid a visit and were loudly cheered. His Worship made a brief speech and then the parade men on the success of the parade.

The Fireworks

The fire works display on the South side of King Square was witnessed by one of the largest crowds ever gathered in the city. The rockets frightened some horses and accidents were narrowly averted. In one instance a frightened animal at the head of King street, where the crowd was the thickest, was prevented from running into the densely packed mass only by the prompt action of a policeman.

Mayor Prink, Ald. Jones, and Col. Studee, who were the judges for the afternoon parade, awarded first prize to the Zulus, the Dartmouth Fire Brigade second, and Village Blacksmiths and Village Kitchen third. Queen Mab and her fairies and the Tambourine girls received honorable mention. One hundred dollars will be given as prizes.

The afternoon parade of the national societies and Polymorphians was the most elaborate and the longest ever seen in St. John. Throughout the long march the streets were lined on either side by admiring crowds. The men in line looked their best. With few exceptions they were garbed in the regulation dress, black clothes, silk hats, white ties and gloves, and certainly they made a fine impression. The marching was good and the long route did not seem to dismay the veterans in the parade who finished as fresh as the youngsters. Ald. N. E. McLean acted as grand marshal and proved very efficient. One little hitch occurred when a large float had trouble in going down King street and the first half of the parade left the float in the North End and the return was without any further delays. Barouches, containing members of the common council, County Secretary Kelley and City Engineer Murdoch, led the procession. Ald. McLean rode in front of the parade with St. Mary's Band also in the van. Then came Marlborough Lodge, No. 207, Sons of England, illustrating "To Have and to Hold." Charles, Lord was leading a British bull dog of the typical breed and A. G. Logan also walked ahead of the banner as second bearer. Then came about sixty members of the lodge in regulation dress, followed by eight members dressed in Canadian seamen. These were F. Punter, E. Brittain, Geo. Tonge, G. W. Macaulay, George Liffé, G. Willis, L. Stephens and Fred Byfield. The model of the battleship Niobe on a float, driven by Ernest Chapman, was ten feet in length, painted in a dainty drab color and with the complete equipment of the first ship of the Canadian navy, including wireless telegraph, search light, and this float attracted much attention and was accorded hearty applause as it passed along.

Portland Lodge, No. 246, Sons of England, were next in line, also about sixty in number, marshalled by Haas Taylor. Ald. R. W. Wigmore, mounted, acted as general marshal for the Sons of England. Following the Sons of England came Grand Master Harry Sellen, in a barouche, surrounded by a bodyguard of third degree swordsmen, drawn from the North End, Fairview and Carleton lodges of the Protestant Association of Prentice Boys. About seventy-five second and first degree members from the three lodges followed, marshalled by Chip Sweet.

The Prentice Boys wore their regulation uniforms with the silk aprons and looked very nice.

The Carleton Cornet Band were given a place in the procession at this point and led the large representation of Orangemen. Twenty-five members of Trinity Preceptory, R. B. K. K. L. in their elaborate uniform, led this order. About thirty members of the Scarlet Chapter were next in line, followed by the lodge in turn, each with a silken banner. York, No. 3, led with George A. Earle, W. M., at their head, and about thirty in line.

Johnston, No. 24, had about the same number turning out.

Portland, No. 1, was represented by sixteen members, while Dominion No. 141 had about sixty in line.

As a part of the showing of Havlock Lodge, No. 12, the largest float of the parade on that day a group of children who produced the coronation ceremony in St. Luke's church, was drawn by several horses. Murray Hatheway represented the King, and Mary McKim the Queen. During the parade the children sang God Save the King and this proved an attractive feature.

Verner, No. 1, Eldon, No. 1, and Gideon, No. 7, were also represented in the parade. Then came several barouches containing district and county lodge officers. Lieut. Col. Baxter, County Master, did not take part in the afternoon parade owing to the
