PRESIDENT HARDING ON AMERICANIZATION

(From his address to Congress) There are pending bills for the registration of the alien who has come to our shores. I wish the passage of such an act might be expedited. Life and American opportunities are worth seeking, and the nation has the right to know who are citizens in the making or who live among us and share our advantages while seeking to undermine our cherished institutions. This provision will enable us to guard against the abuses in immigration, checking the undesirable whole irregular coming in his first violation of our laws. More, it will facilitate the needed Americanizing of those who mean to enroll as fellow citizens.

and woman find our doors closed after long voyages and wasted savings, because they are unfit for admission. It would be kinder and safer to tell them before they embark.

Our programme of admission and treatment of immigrants is very intimately related to the educational policy of the republic. With illiteracy estimated at from 2-10 of 1 per cent, to less than 2 per cent, in 10 of the most nations of Europe, it rivets our attention to a serious problem when we are reminded of a 6 per cent illiteracy in the United States. The figures are based on the test which defines an illiterate as one having no reading ability. Remembering the wide freedom of our public schools, with compulsory attendance in many states in the union, one is convinced that much of the illiteracy comes to us from abroad, and the education of the immigrant becomes a requisite to his Americanization. It must be done if he is fitfully to exercise the duties as well as enjoy the privileges of American citizenship. Here is revealed the special field for Federal co-operation in furthering education.

From the very beginning public education has been left mainly in the hands of the states. So far as schooling youth is concerned the policy has been justified, because no responsibility can be so effective as that of the local community alive to its task. I believe in the co-operation of the national authority to stimulate, encourage and

CREW RESCUED
