WOULD REQUIRE SCHEDULES TO END BY AUG. 1

Quebec Baseball Association Joins the New Organization

Local amateur baseball leaders are watching with interest a move on the part of the newly-formed National Baseball Association of Canada to arrange plans for a Dominion-wide organization to place the game on a sounder basis and try to arrange play-offs to decide the national championship, similar to what is being done in hockey and basketball. In the latter sport, Saint John fans this year were privileged to witness the semi-finals, and as the baseballers around this city are noted for the excellent baseball talent they develop, it would not be a surprising thing to see a team from Saint John competing for the Canadian title in the not too distant future. Officials of the Saint John League, the winner of which is expected to participate this year in the play-off for the provincial, and, if successful, the Maritime titles, have written for further particulars, and the matter will probably come before them at a meeting shortly.

Quebec Joins.
The hands of the new organization was strengthened considerably recently when the Quebec Baseball Association decided to affiliate with the new national organization. It is possible the matter will come before the semi-annual meeting of the M. P. B. today in Moncton if the matter of a Maritime baseball association is considered.

The idea of the new organization is to bring amateur baseball in Canada under the heading of a major sport and each year arrange play-offs between the different provincial title-holders and thus declare a Canadian champion. To have the final held before baseball interest wanes and before cold weather sets in, the new body is endeavoring to create a plan whereby each section would declare a champion early in July. Under the present state of affairs, this would be impossible, as the many leagues draw up long summer schedules which carry them into September. To overcome this difficulty, it has been suggested that the ball men work out a series early in the year similar to that used by the soccer men when playing for the Connaught Cup, emblematic of the soccer championship of Canada. This end is accomplished by staging a special play-down series in each section besides the holding of the regular scheduled games.

It is possible that the new order of things may be put into operation this season, though the National Baseball Association of Canada, being a new organization, is not yet in proper working order.

In connection with their plans to affiliate with the N. B. A. of C., the Quebec Amateur Baseball Association elected Arch McNeil their president, and in the national council will send forward the suggestion that the time set for the declaring of a representative champion be extended from the first of July to the latter part of the month.

VETERAN WINS FROM CHAMPION IN SHORT MATCH

Physicians Claim Munn Was Ill With Tonsillitis

PHILADELPHIA, April 16.—Stanislaus Zbysko, 38-year-old veteran of the mat, again rules the world as champion of wrestlers.

He regained the title he lost several years ago, by conquering Wayne (Big) Munn, last night in two straight falls, and in less than fourteen minutes of actual wrestling. A cleverly executed forearm hold earned the first fall for the veteran, while he scored the second and deciding fall with a forearm and hammer lock.

The First Fall.
Zbysko exhibited the same mat prowess against his more youthful opponent that brought him the championship years ago, and clearly demonstrated that Munn's great strength was no match for the science of the master grappler. Reaching only to the shoulders of the giant westerner and weighing about fifty pounds less, Zbysko wriggled from his grasp every time when he attempted a pin fluke. Then, watching his opportunity Zbysko gained a body hold, lifted his opponent high in the air, and hurled him to the floor, pinning his shoulders to the mat a few seconds later.

Repeated Performance.
After the intermission he repeated the performance, and soon had Munn on his back in the grip that returned to him the heavyweight crown.

After the bout club physicians who examined Munn, said that he was suffering from acute tonsillitis, and that he had fainted during the intermission between the first and second falls. Doctors said he had no fever when they examined him before the match. Zbysko is 35 years old and weighs 210 pounds.

In New York the attendance was placed at 50,000, Detroit 35,000, Chicago 38,000, Cincinnati 32,000, Philadelphia 22,000, St. Louis 21,000, Brooklyn 20,000 and Boston 15,000. These figures are convincing and prove, beyond a doubt, that baseball is as popular as ever. The games not only create interest in the States, but throughout Canada as well. In many cities in the Dominion fans eagerly scan the score columns and then look over their little piece of cardboard to see how they made out in the total runs scored.

WAYNE MUNN did not retain his title of world's heavyweight wrestling champion very long. As was pointed out in this column some time ago Munn is exceptionally strong but was not a very clever wrestler.

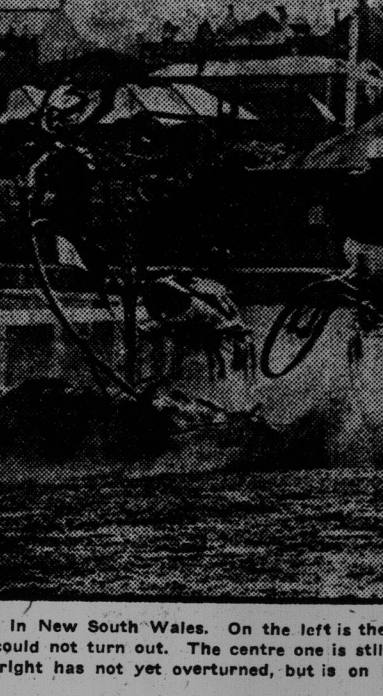
