The counsel of Ahithophel, who left David to join Absalom, was as if a man had inquired at the oracle of God, but in anquired at the oracle of God, but in answer to David's prayer, that God would turn the counsel of Ahithophel into foolishness God saw fit to do it through Hushai, David's friend (xv, 31, 34, 37; xvi, 23; xvii, 14). There is great comfort to a believer in the words of Ps. xxxiii, 10, 11, "The country of the Levil grapheth forever, the Levil grapheth forever, the sel of the Lord standeth forever, the thoughts of his heart to all genera-tions." See also Isa. xiv, 24, and it is our privilege to rest in the assurance of the "all things" of Rom. viii, 28; Il Cor. iv, 15, and to take even the curs-Cor, iv, 15, and to take even the cursing of a Shimel (xvi, 5, 12) as permitted by God to show His power in due time and change the curse to a blessing. See the sequel to this event in chapter xix, 16, 20. If we would have perfect rest we must believe firmly that the Lord is roundabout His people, as the mountains, as a hedge as a fire, and that nothing can pos-sibly come through without His peron, not even the barking of a

mission, not even the barking of a dog (Ex. xi, 7).

The phrase "David's friend" (xv, 37; xvi, 16) reminds us of Abraham, the friend of God (H Chron. xx, 7; Isa, xii, 8; Jas. ii, 23), and of our Lord's words, "I have called you friends" (John xv.

15). Why not be more worthy of such a royal friend? The friendship of this world is enmity with God, and it is impossible to be a friend of the world and of God too (Jas. iv, 4). The manner of Ahithophel's going out of this world (17, 23) has grown to be the common thing in our day, not hanging. common thing in our day, not hanging, but the taking of his own life, another indication that the return of the King indication that the return of the King draweth near, Mahanaim, where Shobi and Machir and Barzillai met David and his people with so much kindness, makes ur remember the kindness of God to Jacob in some of the dark days and that we, too, have the ministry of angels as well as of visible friends (xvii, 27, 29; Gen. xxxii, 2).

Our lesson chapter opens with the going forth of David's army under Joab, Abishai and Ittal, with the words of David ringing in their ears, "Deal

The armies met, and David's followers were victorious. There was a great slaughter of Absalom's followers, and Absalom himself was slain miserably by the hand of Joab and thrown into a pit and covered with a heap of stones (17). His beautiful head of hair was seemingly his ruin (verse 9, chapter xiv, 26). How often it is that what one prizes most becomes the undoing of such a one! Pride of any kind always leads to a fall. ENGLISHMAN CHOSEN.

Bishop of Stepney May Succeed Late Bishop Carmichael.

Montreal, Oct. 30.—By the unanimous vote of the diocesan synod last night the Rev. Cosmo Gordon Lang, Bishop of Stepney and Suffragan to the Bishop of London since 1901, was declared elected to the Bishopric of Montreal.

This vote confirmed a seventh and final ballot in which the Bishop of Stepney had received a practically unanimous vote. The figures of the seventh ballot were as follows: Clerical vote—Right Rev. Bishop Lang, 89; Principal Rexford, 4; Dean Evans, 3; Dean Fagthing, 4; Archdeacon Ker, 1; Rev. Osborne Troop, 1. The lay vote polled 70 for Lang and 7 for Farthing.

The following cablegram was sent to the Bishop of Stepney: "The Synod of Montreal, consisting of 107 clergy and 300 lay delegates, have unanimously elected you bishop and earnestly hope you may accept." A reply from the bishop is expected tomorrow.

The supporters of both these clerics precipitated a deadlock and the laymen refused to support Dean Evans, while going solid for Farthing. On the other hand, the clerical vote supported Evans, although Farthing had a slowly increasing number of adherents.

The question as to whether Bishop Lang will accept is regarded dubiously in both cleric and lay circles here, as he is in direct line for preferment as coadjutor to the Bishop of London.

It was recommended that an effort be made to have a larger share of this class of immigrants assigned to the

Baptist Report Favors Socialism But Condems Propaganda Methods

Ottawa, Oct. 30.—In the home mission report laid before the Baptist convention yesterday there were reference to Socialism.

"In its varied forms," said the report, "labor unions, trades unions, professional associations and farmers' clubs, Socialism represents ar emergence of a world-consciousness and world-conviction that at the present day social and economic conditions are not right; that the race can not reach its highest development under these conditions; that the principle that should regulate social and business life should be co-operation and non-competition."

Every one of the basic principles of the movements were embodied in the constitution of the church, but the danger mig out of the work of the so-called scialistic leaders in such place as foronto were emphasized.

"There are constantly forming in the very licart of the city new communities of foreign peoples," said the report. "These people are scarcely landed in the city before the Socialistic leaders are after them. The new principles taught them are revolutionary rather than reformatory." It was emphasized that the church should endeavor more and more to cope with this evil.
