The fifth regular meeting of Excelsior No. 166 was held at the Municipal Office Rush Lake, May 6th, 1919.

Present: Reeve Friesen and Councillors McCann, Wilson, Unger, Jahnke and Funk.

Moved by Funk that a pedlers license be granted to J. H. Lamond from May 1st to Dec. 31st 1919, at the rate of \$15.00 per year. Carried.

Moved by Wilson that W. A. Hurford be allowed to fence road allowance North of North East 9-16-12-3, provided gates be erected. Carried.

Moved by Funk that Fred Haller be permitted to fence road allowance between S. E. 15-16-11-3 and S. W. 14-16-11-3, provided gates be erected. Carried.

Moved by Reeve Friesen that Sec. Treas. apply to Sask. Landing Municipality for copy of assessment covering portion of that Municipality now attached to Excelsior No. 166, and also communicate with the Dept. of Municipal Affairs for full particulars respecting average comprised in each quarter section bounded by the Swift Current Creek. Carried.

Moved by Funk that Dept. of Highways instructions be complied with and compensation be paid for roadway between Sections 14 and 23 in 18-12-3. Carried.

Moved by Reeve Friesen that Cr. McCann be deputed to consult with Mr. J. M. Wiens respecting closing of road between north half and south half of 15-17-10-3. Carried.

Moved by McCann that bills for gopher poison distributed on unoccupied lands must be submitted before Oct 1st, or else payment be refused. Carried.

Moved by Unger that land owners who do not poison gophers on their land before May 15th, that councillors will take steps to do so and costs will be charged against same. Carried.

SPEAKER OF ALBERTA LEGISLATURE DEAD

EDMONTON. — Hon. C. W. Fisher, speaker of Alberta legislature, died last week at his residence here after a few weeks' illness.

Hon. Charles Wellington Fisher was the son of James and Elizabeth Fisher. He was born August 4, 1866, at Hyde Park Corner, Middlesex county, Ont., and educated at Hyde Park and London, Ont.

Mr. Fisher married Helen Marjorie Powell on April 3, 1907, at Ottawa. He engaged in the merchandising business and was elected a member of the legislative assembly of the Northwest Territories for Banff at a by-election Jan. 26, 1903.

In 1905 he was elected for the first constituency to the legislative assembly of Alberta at the first general election.

Mr. Fisher was re-elected for the new constituency of Cochrane in 1909, 1913, and again in 1917 and was elected speaker of the house at the first session of the Alberta legislature, re-elected at the opening of the first session of the second legislature and again put in this term at the opening of the first session of the third legislature, and also at the first session of the fourth legislature.

Mr. Fisher served as a major in the 15th Light Horse. He was a Presbyterian, a Liberal in political life and his home was at Cochrane, Alberta.

UNREST DUE TO VAINGLORY OF WEALTHY

CALGARY. — Lavish display of wealth by citizens who possess it, the extravagance of governments, federal, provincial and municipal, the prodigal manner in which the lands and other natural resources of Canada have been showered on speculators and other exploiters of the public, and the existence of the protective tariff were among reasons assigned for the prevailing unrest by the witnesses before the royal commission on industrial relations.

Throughout the two days' sessions, the commission has heard evidence representative of the opinion of the community. Of the many explanations of the discontent in the industrial world, perhaps that given by Rev. Wm. Irvine and emphasized by Mrs. Corne, during the concluding hour of the final sitting, was the most representative of the general body of opinion. "The working people," said Mr. Irvine, "are reaching out to a fuller life."

Hon. W. H. Cushing said the extravagance of governments in the past had something to do with the serious situation today. No private business ruin as federal, provincial or municipal governments are run today would last a week.

Walter Smitten, labor leader, and Rev. A. E. Smith, of Brandon, favored industrial councils. Mrs. McKinney, M.L.A., said the monied interests were ruling Canada today.

Almonied autocracy now governs Canada, in the opinion of the farmers," declared Mrs. McKinney, M.L.A., and a member of the Non-Partisan league. The farmers were convinced that they were being exploited in the interests of autocracy. The remedy they proposed was direct political action.

As the old parties were wedded to the present system, the first thing required was to change the form of government.

Mrs. McKinney said, in answer to Mr. Moore, that she had not given much consideration to proposals for parliamentary representation of group interests in place of the present geographical constituencies. The system had been introduced, however, in the election of two soldier representatives in the Alberta legislature. She thought it very important that drink should be totally eliminated if the working men were to be in fit condition to win their rights.

VIEWS OF FARMERS ON LABOR UNREST ARE ALSO SOUGHT

CALGARY. — At the close of the sessions here the industrial commissioners pointed out that they were anxious to secure the evidence of farmers as well as other classes, as the situation affects them as vitally as others.

BRITISH COLUMBIA CANADA SHOULD SETTLE APPEALS IN OWN COURTS

VANCOUVER. — A protest against the necessity of sending Canadian appeals to the privy council was made by Justice Martin, of the British Columbia court of appeals, in the course of a legal decision here.

"When our sons," said the lordship, "have shown that Canada is fit to cope with any nation in the world on the field of war, certainly the fathers of these sons who have been at the front ought at least be able to cope with all competitors in the field of jurisprudence."

In the case in question the court held that the workmen's compensation board benefits do not apply to the dependents of the crew of the steamship Princess Sophia, lost in United States territorial waters last fall. A direct appeal to the privy council was approved.

Eastern Provinces STRIKE AT TORONTO

TORONTO. — Hon. Gideon Robertson, minister of labor, left Ottawa last week for Toronto and has asked that the committees from the striking metal trades and packing unions meet him in the Prince George hotel, to review the situations in detail.

This, according to the parties interested in the strikes, will affect more than 8,000 workers of Toronto and involve millions in capital and is the nearest approach to a prospect of a settlement.

TEMPERANCE BEER AND PUBLIC MORALS

MONTREAL. — A shock awaits the many temperance beer restaurants in Montreal—they are to get no licenses. The government has decided on this policy and as a result the license commission will issue none this year.

The decision to eliminate these temperance beer places is a result of the report of the provincial revenue officers. Most of them made their own hours and kept open all night, as well as on holidays and Sunday. Many operated respectable establishments, but many more, it is claimed, fell short.
