

SPEAKER OF ALBERTA LEGISLATURE DEAD

EDMONTON. - Hon. C. W. Fi sher, speaker of Alberta legislature, died last week at his residence ere after a few weeks' illness.

Hon. Charles Wellington Fisher was the son of James and Elizabeth Fisher. He was born August 4, 1866, at Hyde Park Corner, Mid-dlesex county, Ont., and educated at Hyde Park and London, Ont Mr. Fisher married Helen Marjorie Powell on April 3, 1907, at Ottawa

He engaged in the merchandis ing business and was elected nember of the legislative assembly of the Northwest Territories for Banff at a by-election Jan 26, 1903. In 1905 he was elected for the first constituency to the legislative as sembly of Alberta at the first gen eral election.

Mr. Fisher was re-elected for the ew constituency of Cochrane in 1909, 1913, and again in 1917 and was elected speaker of the house at the first session of the Alberta legislature, re-elected at the opening of the first session of the second le gislature and again put in this term at the opening of the first session of the third legislature, and also at the first session of the fourth | CANADA SHOULD



There were, at the outbrek of hostilities, some hundred and ten licensed amateur stations in Canada. These licenses were all withdrawn as a war measure, and amateur stations have not been operating in Canada since Au gust, 1944.
