The War! New York, July 25.—A despatch to the Herald from Santiago via Port Antonio, says:—Great excitement was caused in Santiago, today, (Thursday), by a story brought in by the Cuban press.

Nothing happening in this vicinity has taken the American troops off their guard so completely by surprise as this story of battle between the Cubans and the Spaniards.

It is not stated how far to the Northwest of Santiago General Garcia's army had proceeded upon their march. The march was accompanied by a heavy force of Spanish troops.
