N. W. M. P. FORCE. A WEAK CANVASS.
Hundred Men Will Be Added Owing to Large Area to Be Covered.

In view of the largely increased sphere of operations of the Northwest Mounted Police and the immense area of territory which they now have to patrol, the force is to be augmented by 100 men. At present the police number 80, of whom 500 are in the Northwest and 300 in the Yukon. The force has never been numerous enough for the vast region it has to oversee and maintain order in, but with the addition of the Yukon to the territory to be policed and the establishment of posts on the Arctic coast and in Hudson Bay an increase in number becomes imperatively necessary.

DR. MORRISON'S CALL

Official Request from Chicago Received—It is Understood He Will Probably Accept.

Rev. A. H. Foster, clerk of the Presbytery of St. John, has received the official call issued by the First Church of Chicago, to Dr. J. A. Morrison of this city.

A special meeting of the presbytery will be held in the near future to consider this call.

It is understood that Dr. Morrison has decided to accept, although as yet he has not made any definite statement. Members of St. David's congregation, while regretting the possible loss of their pastor cannot help feeling pleased that he has been asked to fill such an important pulp as that of the church to which he has been called.

The First Church of Chicago was established in 1837, when the congregation met in old Fort Dearborn.

Regarding the call to Dr. Morrison the Chicago Interior, Feb. 4th, says:

"The selection of a pastor for Chicago First Church, to fill the historic pulpit vacant since the lamentable death of Dr. Chichester, is an event of great importance to the church and to the city."

The First Church occupies the most prominent position in the city and its members are among the most influential and successful of the city.

Dr. Morrison was born of Scotch parents in a Quebec village, thirty-six years ago. The ordinary classical and theological equipment of a Presbyterian minister he received through McGill University and the Montreal Presbyterian College, but so high was his conception of the demand of the minister's vocation that he would not content himself without further training.

The universities of Edinburgh, Berlin and Oxford, and the University of Toronto, at St. John, he is exceptionally popular and influential.

His pulpit delivery is striking and lends an impressive force to the Gospel message from his lips, while his graces of character beautifully substantiate his preaching. Dr. Morrison will be warmly welcomed into Chicago and to the fellowship of the denomination."

OTTAWA NEWS.

OTTAWA, Feb. 10.—According to the last census there were 4,572 Japanese in Canada in 1901, of whom 4,515 resided in British Columbia.

His Worship Mayor White:

The report of the transportation commission recommends the immediate undertaking of the improvement works in the harbor of St. John, and the future of the port of St. John with its restricted area and the possibility of other railways seeking accommodation there in the near future necessitating additional expenditures, your commission suggests that in the future, before the city of St. John sells, leases and alienates in any way any harbor frontage the city authorities should communicate with the Dominion government and secure its sanction to the action.

Of this kind is entered into or port placed under the control of harbor commission and the harbor committee of the port receive further public aid. This recommendation looks reasonable and I would like it is acceptable to the St. John civic authorities.

During a long discussion, Ald. Bullock and Christie were made members of the harbor committee. This committee will meet Mr. Emerson this afternoon and discuss harbor matters with him.
