BRANT AND TECUMSEH,

Of the representatives of the Red race, John Fiske, the American histor-ian said Joseph Brant "was perhaps the greatest Indian of whom we have any knowledge," and that "certainly the history of the red men presents no more many-sided and interesting char-acter." Brant. whose Indian name was Thay-endances, belonged to the Mohawk tribe, that one of the Five Nations (af-terward the Six Nations). He was born about 1740 or 1742, on the banks of the Ohio, where his mother had ac-companied her tribe on a hunting ex-pedition. The statement that he was a half-breed is not borne out in his-tory. 
