Sheriff Stuart and Mrs. Stuart were in town a few days ago.

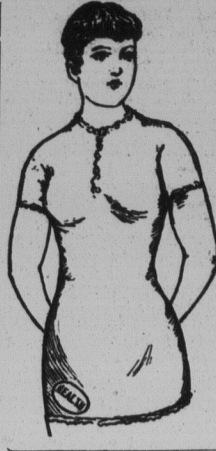
Miss Laura Wetmore, who has been spending the summer in Sussex, returned last week.
