BRADY AFTER THE BIG MILL WITH \$80,000

New York, Nov. 10.—The Herald this morning says: William A. Brady, who formerly managed James J. Jeffries, made an offer last night to give the retired heavyweight champion \$100,000 as a gift if he will fight Al Kaufman within 60 days.

No stipulation is made as to the event of Jeffries being beaten. Under the agreement which he made with Felix Isman, Jeffries is to get the sum merely for going into the ring with Kaufman. If the old champion elects, the bout may be held in private or in public, at any place that Jeffries may name.

After the offer had been made by Brady, Isman went to see Jeffries and told him that if he saw his way clear to make the match \$100,000 would be his absolutely. Isman told Jeffries that he would give the additional \$100,000 for a side bet and that if Jeffries beat Kaufman he would get at least \$20,000 for the fight.
