HIGH SCHOOL DOWNS
ROTHESAYBRADY AFTER
THE BIG MILL
WITH \$80,000

New York, Nov. 10.—The Herald this morning says: William A. Brady, who formerly managed James F. Jeffries, made an offer last night to give the retired heavyweight champion \$10,000 as a gift if he will fight Al. Kaufman within 60 days. Brady, who has had a long and successful career in the ring, has said time and again that he believed Kaufman could beat Jeffries, and to give evidence of the sincerity of his ideas of the merits of the former and the latter, after his long retirement, Brady posted \$10,000 with Max Blumenthal to be given to Jeffries with no strings attached if he will go ten rounds against Kaufman.

No stipulation is made as to the event of Jeffries being beaten. Under the agreement which he made with Felix Isman, Jeffries is to get the sum merely for going into the ring with Kaufman. If the old champion so elects, the bout may be held in private or in public, at any place that Jeffries may name. In addition to the \$10,000, which Brady is willing to give Jeffries to get into the ring with Kaufman for a ten round bout, he also posted \$1,000 to go as a forfeit for a side bet of \$10,000 that Kaufman will be victorious if the fight is held. Isman covered the sum, taking the Jeffries end. Furthermore, Brady bet \$4,000 to \$5,000 with Isman that Johnson will beat Jeffries. Max Blumenthal is the stakeholder of this wager.

After the offer had been made by Brady, Isman went to see Jeffries and told him that if he saw his way clear to make the match \$10,000 would be his absolutely. Isman told Jeffries that he would bet the additional \$10,000 for a side bet and that if Jeffries beat Kaufman he would get at least \$20,000 for the fight. When Jeffries was asked what he thought of it, he said: "It is so soft that it looks suspicious. Every one knows Brady's dislike for me. I will give an answer before four o'clock this afternoon."

Brady Not Serious.
New York, Nov. 10.—The sporting world, just now keenly interested in the coming Jeffries-Johnson fight, noted with interest today the report of an offer by William A. Brady, a theatrical manager, to post \$10,000, the entire sum to go to Jeffries, if he would agree to fight "Al" Kaufman within ninety days. Interest increased throughout the day when no word of reply came from Jeffries, but to night the bottom dropped out of the report when Sam Berger, Jeffries' manager, did some talking. "When the bids have been opened and the club and date settled for the Jeffries-Johnson fight, then if Wm. A. Brady comes forward with the \$10,000 cash, Jeffries will consider meeting Kaufman," said Berger. "As it is now," said Berger, "neither he nor Jeffries considered Brady's published offer seriously. They had heard nothing of it," he said, "except through the newspapers."

Boston, Mass., Nov. 10.—"Battling" Nelson, the lightweight champion of the world, who is appearing at a local theatre, tonight wired that he would give \$85,000 to have the coming fight between the two take place on his property at Virginia City, Nevada, 30 miles from Reno. Nelson offers to post \$30,000.
