

WEST SIDE LADIES HAVE A COMPLAINT

Claim They Received Discourteous Treatment at Union Depot Last Evening.

A number of young ladies who are members of the First Soldiers' Comfort Association in West St. John are anything but pleased by the treatment they claim to have received at the Union Depot last evening. One of the young ladies in speaking to The Standard said that the members of the association had prepared fifty boxes containing lunches for the soldiers of the Siege Battery, but on learning that the battery boys were not going to leave the city for some time it was decided to present the lunches to the soldiers of the 211th. The colonel of this regiment was communicated with and he told the association members he would be pleased to accept the lunches for his men and for the young ladies to be at the depot not later than 7.30 o'clock. The committee with the half hundred boxes were on hand at the appointed time, but they only reached as far as the trainshed gate. They informed one of the military officers at the gate that they were members of the Soldiers' Comfort Association and had lunches for the soldiers. They state that the officer was not one of 211th and he told them that it did not matter as no person was allowed through the gate, and that they would have to remain outside the shed the same as any other visitors. The result was that many of the lunch boxes were badly broken in the crush and it was not until after the first section of the regiment had departed that the committee were allowed through the gates, and then a soldier of the 211th gathered up what was left of the boxes and carried them to a car. The soldier thanked the young ladies for their kindness and said the lunches would be very acceptable as the boys were hungry.

St. John Art Club.

At the monthly meeting of the St. John Art Club, held in their studio on Peel street, M. V. Paddock gave an interesting talk on the "Congressional Library in Washington," illustrating his remarks with some fine views of the library. He described the library as the most ornate and handsomest library building in the world. The building cost in the vicinity of \$1,000,000, and has many wall paintings and mosaics designed and painted by American painters. One picture in particular, "The Declaration of Independence," is done on parchment, illuminated in old English and around the border are miniatures of scenes descriptive of events in the lives of the men who signed the declaration. This picture is very valuable, costing about \$50,000, and is the work of several painters of note. In speaking of the periodical room he said there was a set of books, one for each year, containing a list of every article that has been written. In this room can be found every publication that has been published on this side of the Atlantic. President W. S. Fisher was in the chair and introduced Mr. Paddock. The ladies in charge of the refreshments were as follows: Mesdames Alward, Robertson, Gilmo and Estabrook, and Misses McGovern and Stephenson.

DECIDED IMPROVEMENT IN WATER PRESSURE

Commissioner Wigmore Arranges Improvements which Benefit People on Higher Levels in Lancaster District.

The extensions of the water mains in Bay Shore Road and Beaconsfield avenue, have been completed and connected with the main in Sea street. This has made possible a division of the service in that section, and as a result there is a decided improvement in the pressure on the higher levels. This together with the increased pressure obtained through the putting into repair of the plumbing and consequent saving in consumption is expected to very largely remove the trouble which existed last winter.

The pipe for the Moore's Hill extension is on the way here, Commissioner Wigmore having been notified that four carloads of 24 inch water pipe had been shipped.

The repairs to the gate of the 12 inch main on King street in front of M. R. A.'s have been completed and a vault built around it.
