HEAVY DEMAND FOR STEELS AND EQUIPMENTS

This Demand, Extending to Other Industrials, Caused Heavy Covering of Short Contracts.

New York, Jan. 24.—An unexpected demand for steel and equipments which later extended to many other active industrials, featured today's brief but lively stock market, causing heavy covering of short contracts.

Activity centered in Crucible Steel and other independent shares of that group, Crucible adding twelve points to yesterday's gain of seven points in connection with the company's forthcoming stock recapitalization.

Oils, leather, textiles and shippings also registered advances of one to three and a half points with miscellaneous specialties among which were industrial alcohol and international paper.

The motor issues were heavy at the outset in consequence of further pressure directed against general motors, but that stock rallied before the close, related shares and their subsidiaries also making variable gains.

Rails were again conspicuous for their extreme dullness, none of the leaders of the division making more than fractional changes. Final prices in most instances were at or near maximum quotations of the session. Total sales amounted to 375,000 shares.

An actual decrease of \$4,000,000 in loans and discounts, a \$30,000,000 contraction in reserves of members at the local central bank and a decrease of almost \$21,000,000 in total reserves were the noteworthy features of the clearing house statement. Bonds of all descriptions were lower. Liberty first 4's and second 4's making new low record for the movement. International also reacted. Total sales par value, aggregated \$7,275,000.

U. S. Old's and new coupon and registered advanced 1 1/2 per cent, and Panama 3's declined half per cent on call during the week.

DISQUIETING NEWS FROM STRIKERS IN BOMBAY

Military Compelled to Fire Into Crowd, Causing Many Casualties, One Being Killed

Bombay, India, Tuesday, Jan. 20.—Disquieting news from the mill area in the Bombay precinct, where 200,000 cotton workers went on strike early this month, reports the firing by the military on a crowd of strikers, causing a number of casualties, including one killed.

During the morning, the strikers state, the crowds in the district began holding up street cars and other vehicles and compelling the passengers to alight. Later the strikers became more riotous, and the military, after giving warning, it is declared, were compelled to fire. It is stated that one person was killed and some wounded.
