ST. JOHN PEOPLE FROM ALL OVER THE MARITIME PROVINCES MAY GO OFFER THE EVANS WILLIAMS

Several Relatives in This City Likely to Join Boston Contestants in Effort to Break the Will.

A Boston despatch says: A contest by Boston and Canadian relatives is now threatened in an effort to break the will of the late Robert D. Evans, which was probated in the Essex county court in Salem last August.

In the will, the entire estate, valued at more than \$100,000, was left by the deceased to his widow, Marie Antoinette Evans, which was uncontested and allowed by the court.

Distant relatives of the wealthy man in an effort to appeal the document. The attorneys showed the will to the appearance in the case are Charles F. and John J. Dolan.

The later are retained by Mrs. Lillian M. Keyes, of Roxbury, and Geo. D. Donovan, of this city. Both Mrs. Keyes and Mr. Donovan are children of the late Dennis and Anna Evans. Three other petitioners, also children of the above couple, are Margaret Donovan, of Dorchester; James E. Donovan, of Dorchester; and Timothy H. Donovan, of St. John (N. B.).

They are the children of Ann Evans, who married Dennis Donovan in St. John. Ann Evans was a first cousin of Robert D. Evans' father, so that they are among the nearest of the heirs.

Robert D. Evans left a widow, no children, no brother and one sister, according to Mrs. Keyes. The will was made on August 19, 1893, was filed on July 15, following his sudden death, and was probated on August 2 of last year. An inventory filed showed an estate of personal property valued at \$104,482.38 and real estate of \$18,275.

After bequeathing all his household effects to his wife, the will states: "I give the use, income, improvement and occupation of all the residue and remainder of my estate, real and personal, to my wife, Marie Antoinette, during the remainder of her life, she to have the use of the same without the intervention of a trustee, and in the event of its becoming necessary for her comfortable support and maintenance, of which necessity she is to be the sole judge."

A third clause in the will states that on the death of his wife one-half of the estate shall go to such persons as she appoints or her then heirs-at-law, the other half he bequeathed to his then heirs-at-law.

The petitioners as being nearest relatives are planning to carry the matter to the Supreme Court to decide. The petitioners say that soon after the making of the will, the heirs of the widow in the will concerning the disposal of the property to relatives in event of the death of his widow, but were not interested until learning of the recent activity of Captain Evans of Walsley, toward slaying in the great fortune.
