> A New Brunswick boy in the trenches writes to a friend at home: "The latest papers I received brought news of the government building being burned. You can't imagine the effect it has had on the Canadian boys. Here we are trying to do what we can and at home they are letting the Germans and Austrians run at large instead of taking them into custody and putting them

Austrians run at large instead of taking them into custody and putting them to work, thus keeping them from spoiling what we have at home.

"Wake up, Canadians," he adds. "Protect what we have left at home; we will do our part on this side of the water. Oh! why don't they let the burning of that building be a lesson?

"We are trusting the people at home and by the look of things they are a little careless. You at home are trusting us and I think we are doing what you expect us to do. I hear some of the people at home do not want the soldiers

stationed there. I can tell you it hurts a man in khaki to feel we are not wanted in our own country. Perhaps some day they will be glad to have us."
