OBITUARY NOTICES.

EDWARD WADE.—A native of Kingston, Canada West, son of Mr. Francis Wade, late a pensioner from the Royal Artillery, native of Bristol, England. Mr. E. Wade was a watchmaker, and by his industry accumulated property, leaving his family in competent circumstances. He died on the 29th March, 1847, in the 44th year of his age.

JAMES HUNT, Esquire.—A native of Dartmouth in Devonshire, came to Canada in 1803. During a period of upwards of forty years, Mr. Hunt was actively engaged in commerce; and being a connexion of the highly respectable house of Newman, Hunt and Company, at Oporto, the deceased was Agent in Canada for the sale of the products of Portugal in these Provinces, large consignments of which he annually received. As a Bank Director, and in other offices of trust, he long enjoyed the confidence and respect of his brother Merchants. By a steady perseverance and the highest integrity, he accumulated a large fortune. He died on the 31st March, 1847, aged 67 years.
