Dear Sir William Soulsby,

Colonel Reid Hyde has just shown me your letter which he received at 9 P.M. last night. Mr. King finds that he must leave the luncheon not later than 2 o'clock in order to be at Croydon in time for the casting of the Canadian Bells.
