

GOOD ADDRESS

Text of Dr. Bray's Interesting and Eulogistic Speech at St. Joseph's Hospital Last Evening.

Ladies and Gentlemen:-I have been requested by the Mother Su-perior and Sisters to make a few 1e. marks this evening, at the opening of the new wing, and the establish-ment of a Training School for Nurses in connection with St. Joseph's hospital, and, while I feel flattered at being thus honored, I am also embarassed, and can only attribute the distinction conferred on me to the fact that I am the oldest practitioner in the city, and one of the first to take advantage of the hos-pital established some years ago on a very small scale on Centre Street. But as from little acorns giant oaks do grow, so it has been with this hospital, from a very small and humble beginning with but three sisters and no outside nurses, with very inadequate ac-comodation for about eight or ten patients, and no operating room, it ias grown to what you see to-night. To-day sixty or seventy-five patients can be accomodated in rooms, large, well-ventilated and comfortable. The Halls are commodious and airy. The new operating room, just finished, is one of the best lighted and complete in the Dominion, and should be absolutely asceptic, and in all its appointments, second to none, and superior to many. In addition to the Mother Superior and five or six sisters (all trained nurses) there are no less than ten young ladies engaged in nursing and ready to enter on a course of study in the training school about to be opened. At the head of these is Miss Frances Ber-horst, one of the most competent and capable nurses to be found in any hospital, who will have supposition and capable nurses to be found in any hospital, who will have supervision over the class, and materially assist in their training. Lectures will be given weekly by all the physicians in Chatham, in alphabitical order, on special subjects. The course of study will extend over

a period of three years, when examination will be held, and diplomas

given to the successful students.

With two such well, managed and equipped hospitals and training schools as we have in this city. equipped nospitals that the schools as we have in this city, the sick and suffering are assured that they will receive the best of nursing they will receive the best of nursing and attention. And this is a boon that should be appreciated not only by the poor and destitute, but by those in better circumstances, and to the latter class, I would appeal for a continuance of that practical aid so generously given in the past.

When I contrast the Chatham of to-day with that of thirty-eight or forty years ago, I am amazed at the

to-day with that of thirty-eight or the day's program. There were present at the meeting, the Rector, Rev. Robert McCosh, Wardens John Waddell and J. C. Pritchard, and Messrs. W. E. Rispin, J. C. Weir, Jos. Kenny, G. P. Scholfield, O. L. Lewis, Jos. Barassin, H. W. Smith, Henry Dennis and others.

GAVE HIM ADDRESS. surrounding country, where the penniless and friendless sick are taken in, nursed and treated,-and just here let me say, that the sisters Joseph were the Pioneers of Hospital work in this City-and while the hospitals are a blessing to the sick, they are a great aid to the physician in his work, and no one appreciates this fact more than myself. During the first twenty-five years of my practice in Chatham we were with out a hospital, and no matter what the operation, or the disease, the first had to be performed, and the second treated, at the home of the patient; and sometimes, these homes were mere hovels, surrounded by filth and infested with poisonous germs, so that, in the event of an operation under these circumstances union by first intention was the exceptionand laudable pus and granu-

lations the rule.

How different to-day; a patient operated on antiseptically in this new room, with all the latest appliances and subsequent dressings and attendance given by train-ed and skilled nurses. Is it any wonder that his chances of recovery are immeasurably greater than they possibly could have been before the advent of the hospital. So in such diseases as typhoid lever, pneumonia, diptheria, scarlet fever, and in fact, any serious affection whatever, hospital treat-ment administered by competent nurses under the instruction of a physician, will give much more satisfactory results than could be possibly expected were these diseases treated in a private house.

This being the case, as physicians and teachers it is our duty to see that a high standard is maintained in the training school for nurses, and endeavor to frame a course of lectures that will accomp lish this purpose; and, young ladies, it will be your duty as students to give your very best attention to our teachings, whether clinical, or in the class-room, so that, when your course is ended, and you receive your diploma, you may go from the hospi-tal, feeling satisfied that both we as teachers, and you as students, have done our best.

In conclusion, let me personally, and on behalf of the medical profession of Chatham, tender our most sincere and heartfelt thanks to the Mother Superior. Sisters and nurses of St. Joseph's for the uniform kindness and consideration shown us while on duty in the hospital, and for the care and attention be stowed on our patients. We also offer our congratulations on the addition of this fine new wing, and modern and up-to-date operating room; and my warmest wish is that the hospital may continue to grow in size and usefulness and that grow in size and usefulness and that you, Mother Superior and Sisters, may long be spated to carry on the noble work in which you are engaged, knowing neither rich nor poor, creed nor color, but doing your litework to the best of your ability, and in the interests of suffering humanity; for, of "all good works, the greatest is charity."
