THE WEST KENT LICENSE SITUATION.

It was perhaps inevitable that the Government, in view of its vigorous and righteous stand on the matter of the administration of the license department, should have felt called upon in the light of the recent investigation to ask the retirement of two of the Commissioners. That nothing dishonest was proven against either of them was a source of genuine satisfaction to all their friends, but it was generally felt that they had failed to interpret properly the policy of the new Government. The admirable letter of the Honorable the Provincial Secretary was not sent forth with a wink. It was to be interpreted literally and fully, and to be acted upon in its entirety.

The new Board is composed of men of long and honorable public experience, who will, it is confidently expected, fulfill in the highest measure the hopes and confidence of the Government. Mr. Martin, who remains with them, is a man of excellent judgment who has earned the confidence and esteem of the community.

The brief, inaugural address of Chairman T. A. Smith will strike a responsive chord with the entire community irrespective of political inclinations. A non-partisan policy of hotel-keeping—in the fullest sense which Hon. Mr. Hanna put upon the words—is in complete accord with the principles of the Whitney Government and will do credit to the administration. In so far as the Commissioners live up to the standard of this worthy inaugural will they grow in the confidence and esteem of the community.

It is to be hoped that with this policy in view the Board will grant the license of Mr. Pleasance, of the Hotel Rankin. The Planet is in accord with the view of Commissioner Martin, that this license must be freely granted unless some adequate reasons otherwise are advanced. That the license of a man who unquestionably keeps one of the largest and best hotels in the west, and who for years has never had a complaint lodged against him, should be out off without reason being given savors in the public mind of political persecution and is, of course, in direct antagonism to the Government's policy and the Commission's inaugural. We sincerely regret that the Board yesterday did not look more fully into this matter in their desire, as far as possible, to validate the action of their predecessors. And the same may be said of the shop license.

We have confidence, however, that Mr. Smith and Dr. Mitchell will take the matter into their immediate and careful consideration, and at an early date deal with it upon its merits vindicating the splendid policy inaugurated by Hon. Mr. Hanna and so heartily endorsed by Chairman Smith.

AT REST

There passed away on Saturday afternoon at four o'clock, at his late residence in Palmyra, Mr. James Eberle, in the 65th year of his age.

The late Mr. Eberle has not been a really well man since the death of his wife, which occurred some two years ago. Last year he took a trip to California in the hope that a visit to that sunny clime might do something toward building up a somewhat run-down constitution, but on his return he gradually grew weaker, until, as stated above, on Saturday afternoon the vital spark became extinguished, the sufferer having slept peacefully away.

Deceased lived almost his entire life in the beautiful little village of Palmyra, where he was esteemed as an honest, upright Christian gentleman by everyone in the place and by all in the vicinity who had the privilege of his acquaintance. He was a deacon in the Baptist Church of his native village, and his life was an example which anyone might safely follow.

Besides several brothers and sisters, and a very large circle of relatives and friends, the deceased gentleman leaves to mourn his departure a family of six children, three sons and three daughters. They are: Jason, Harry and Miss Jose, at home; Mrs. (Rev.) Baker, of Palmyra; and Herbert and Miss Clara, of Long Beach, California. The bereaved ones have the sympathy of the entire community in this their hour of affliction.

The funeral took place on Monday afternoon and was largely attended. Interment took place in the family plot adjacent to the home, and the service was conducted (at the request of deceased) by his son-in-law, Rev. Mr. Baker, in the Palmyra Baptist Church.
