ful greeting than that which awaits
them from the patriotic and accom-
plished ladies of the Ursuline Acad-
emy. The reception at "The Pines" will
be an exceedingly charming and
graceful ceremony and do much to add
to the pleasant memories of the Maple
City visit which all Chathamites hope
may be retained by their excellencies.

As the vice-regal party enter the
gate of the Academy they will be met
by Misses Muriel Massey, Margaret
Bell and Blanche Kelly, who will pre-
sent the visiting ladies with beautiful
floral bouquets. Upon driving into the
large conservatory provided the distin-
guished visitors will be greeted by a
splendid chorus of welcome by the
pupils who are gathered in the
grounds. This musical greeting has
been specially arranged for the occasion
and the parts carefully allotted. Miss
Gaven will be the soprano soloist
and the semi-chorus who will con-
tribute the charming mezzo-voice
echoes of the full chorus is composed
of Misses Trankia, Murphy, Brennie,
James, Spereaman and Carson. The
accompaniments will be played throu-
ghout on magnificent N. Swenson
pianos kindly loaned by Mr. Tsch-
hart, by Misses Mabelle Edmondson
and Anna Carson.

A WORK OF ART
Following the musical greeting,
Miss Edith Hall, daughter of Dr. Wm.
R. Hall, will present a souvenir ad-
dress of welcome to Lady Minto. This
is a magnificent piece of delicate
tribute to the talent and accomplish-
ment of the ladies of St. Ursula.
The address is beautifully bound in
white satin, exquisitely laced with

silken cording. The upper corner on
the left of the cover is delicately in-
woven with blue and white satin, the
colors of the Academy. Below is a
rich cluster of hand-painted Heart's-
ease, daisy in chaste coloring and
with marvellously executed shading
effects.

The dedication page is a veritable
artistic gem. Guardian of its in-
signias hovers a hand-painted angel
holding forth the royal coat of arms
in gold. Below is the crest of the Do-
minion perfectly executed, upon which
rests a cornucopia containing the em-
blematic rose, thistle and shamrock.
The Canadian flag is entwined with
the Royal Standard and the whole
rests on an embankment of Maple
branches, the leaves in their rich
autumn coloring. The golden scroll
"The True Patriot is Fame's Greatest
Boast," completes an alluringly aes-
thetic dedication page.

The title page is painted and let-
tered upon old parchment, framed
in rich modern bordering. It is de-
signed to illustrate the inscription
work of the monks and hermits of
medieval times and is lettered in the
old missal illumination, giving an ex-
ceedingly unique and artistic effect.

The address follows, beautifully
painted, page by page, on parchment,
and concludes with a very delicately
wrought representation of the seal of
the Academy.

The entire address, designing and
binding, is the work of the Religious
of "The Pines" and is a wonderful
tribute to their taste and skill.
"It is a marvellous work of art,"
enthusiastically commented his wor-
ship, Mayor McKeough, a gentleman
keenly appreciative of aesthetic ac-
complishment, "a triumph in concep-
tion and execution."
