Miss Chapin's animated expression and exquisite gown contributed very materially to the sunshine effect. "Fear not ye O Israel," by Buck, was sung in masterly fashion.

To say that Miss Chapin charmed her audience is the least that one could say. She was laden with the choicest flowers—roses, orchids and carnations—and received a perfect ovation.
