In the Balkans the Austrians continued to harass the Montenegrins, who made a vigorous if not altogether successful reistance. The combined Teutonic and Bulgarian forces succeeded in compelling the retreat of the Anglo-French force ecross the Greek frontier, with severe losses on both sides. The Allied casual ties were estimated at 1,500. Practically the whole of Serbia is now in the hands of the Central Powers and their Bulgarian

Francis, of the State College of Forestry at Syracuse, who has been making a study of the manurial value of the leaves of trees and shrubs.
