DR. M'MEANS IN THICK OF FIGHT

ful sight it was from our roof, for with darkness, the shooting stopped, and we could go up on the roof of the whole north sky-line was one massive blaze. They burned up fifteen million dollars worth of property, and as insurance companies are not responsible in time of war, this was a complete loss.

By night of the first day, we learned that unless re-inforcements reached us by noon the next day, the city was doomed, so of course none slept that night. The following morning, with daylight, the firing started again, and worse than ever, as the rebels were closing in fast on the center of the city. At noon I learned from an officer that I knew, who came to me, shot through the shoulder, that they could not hold out more than a few hours. At three-thirty we heard the sound of bugles coming down our street and the first contingent of the re-inforcements arrived from Sattilo. They had marched all the way, poor fellows, but as we cheered them on, they cheered back, and ran forward into the fight. By five o'clock the rebels had started to retire and by six we knew we were saved for the present.

The following morning I got out early to see what had happened to the railroad hospital. I felt sure I would find a mass of smoking ruins. The sights that met my eyes I will never forget, if I live a thousand years. Dead bodies on every hand, dead horses almost making the streets impassable and dead men hanging from the light poles and trees in every direction. In one place a few snap-shots, fires still burning in every direction, till one would think the demons of hell had been turned loose, and all this because one man refuses to resign the presidency.

Had there been any means of leaving this blighted country, I would have picked up the family and quit, even if we had to beg our bread in the north, but every line was cut, and had been for weeks before, so we were caught like rats in a trap. From day to day we are living in fear of a return of all this, as the rebels are all around us, but what is still worse for us, should the United States decide to come in, God only knows what would happen to all the foreigners, for the Mexican rebels and federals alike are so bitter against Americans that I fear a general massacre of all foreigners, would take place.

Naturally you say, why don't we get out and accept your invitation to go home. As you know, all my savings have been invested in mines and up until the last year, I could have got out with considerable money. This for the present is all lost, and our expenses are heavy and business practically at a standstill, we have been running behind, the cost of living has increased tremendously and the Mexican dollar has dropped in value until it is only worth 35 cents in gold. I could send my wife and children, but she positively refuses to move a step unless I go with her, and that is entirely out of the question, for unless I stay here and see it out, we might be left absolute paupers.
