## Survivors From Sea

LONDON, Aug. 27.—Thirteen survivors of a Danish trawler, which was sunk by coming in contact with a floating mine in the North Sea, have been landed at Shields. Four of the crew of the trawler lost their lives.

The fisherman was on her way to Iceland, when at 10 o'clock Wednesday night, those on board felt a terrific explosion. Flames shot up around the bows of the vessels and she began to sink rapidly. A small boat was launched, but the vessel foundered before four men in the forecastle could be reached.

Describing his experience, the chief officer, who was on watch, said the concussion hurled him against the wheel house with great violence. He was successful in getting two injured men out of the forecastle, but four others must have been killed in their sleep.

**RECALLED FROM TOKIO.**  
TOKIO, Aug. 27, 12.35 p.m.—The Austrian ambassador, Baron Muller de Szentgyorgy, has been recalled. Reports from Vienna yesterday stated that it had been announced there that the Austrian Government on Tuesday had handed passports to the Japanese ambassador. # BRITISH WOUNDED ARE BROUGHT HOME AND TELL STORY OF BATTLE

Were Rushed into Fight Before Entrenchments  
Could be Dug—Stirring Stories of British  
Artillery Work.

[By Special Wire to the Courier]  
LONDON, Aug. 28.—The Rouen correspondent of The Daily Mail in a despatch to his paper describes the arrival of British wounded there and gives their stories of the fight. He says the appearance of the wounded was terrible, but not harrowing. They were, despite their wounds, not miserable, but instead displayed a cheerful stoicism.

They had all come from the fight in the neighborhood of Mons where two French army corps had successfully held off the enemy on Sunday and Monday. The British troops had taken the field immediately upon their arrival and several days march. They arrived just in time to stem the German onrush.

Although sorely in need of rest they behaved like fresh troops and held their ground with splendid courage earning General Joffre's warm praise.

Not many of the British have bad wounds. Many have only broken down from the hard marching and will be well again in a few days. Most of those who were able, talked with picturesque profanity about their bad luck. One described how his regiment, ordered out of Mons on Sunday morning came under fire immediately. They had no trenches or cover of any kind and were obliged to lie down all day and pop up their heads occasionally to fire. When night fell they did their best to make trenches. Another British regiment was luckier. They were entrenched and although the Germans bombarded them for nearly 24 hours they had very few casualties.

Another of the British wounded, said:  
"We marched into Mons Sunday about ten in the morning and were just about to be billeted when marching orders came and we were off again. We were to advance under cover of artillery fire, but the enemy was doing a bit of artillery work too, so we threw up trenches and snuggled down to wait for what ever might happen."

"We did not wait long. The German gunners were over a ridge two or three miles in front and their shells came whistling around us. I got my baptism of fire and at first did not like it. Fortunately most of their shells burst behind us and did no harm. We thought they might stop when it got dark, but they kept it up as hard as ever."

Some curious rumors are current in the British lines. The Mail's correspondent continues.

## RUSSIAN ACCOUNT

Official Report of the Destruction  
of the German Cruiser  
Magdeburg

[By Special Wire to the Courier]  
ST. PETERSBURG, via London, Aug. 28.—10.35 a.m.—The Russian official account of the destruction of the German Cruiser Magdeburg differs little from the German admiralty report. It says:  
"Thursday morning when the fog lifted our two cruisers were sent to look for the Magdeburg and opened fire when they found her. The German cruiser replied but her fire soon ceased. The Russian shells destroyed the funnels and caused an explosion which shattered the bows as far as the captain's bridge. Some of the officers and crew were taken prisoner."

**BROKE THROUGH LINES.**  
LONDON, Aug. 28.—4.50 a.m.—A despatch to The Times from Boulogne says it is asserted that the German troops presumably cavalry broke through the French lines near Arras in the province of Pas De Calais. The French moved up with rapidity, it is declared, and have the situation well in hand. The despatch says that the allied troops are being swiftly arranged to deal with any further attempt to break through the line between Dunkirk and Lille.
