BEE-KEEPERS' CONVENTION.

A Number of prominent Bee Men Meet and Form an Association.

On Saturday last, in the town hall, Athens, there was formed what is to be known as "The Bee-keepers Association of the United Counties of Leeds and Greyville." The meeting was held in the town hall, and was presided over by Mr. M. B. Holmes, of Athens, who was recognized as the bee-keepers generally throughout the county, and it was in compliance with their expressed wish that Mr. M. B. Holmes, of Athens, took the initiative steps and brought the matter before the public.

The response, as far as numbers were concerned, was not so encouraging as was expected, but the men at Saturday's meeting included some of the most experienced honey-producers of the county, and their presence and unanimous action at the convention are strong evidence that a prosperous and useful career awaits the association.

The convention opened at 11 a. m. when Mr. F. L. Moore, of Addison, was elected to preside. The work of organization was then proceeded with, and resulted in the election of the following officers:

President, M. B. Holmes, Athens. Vice-President, F. L. Moore, Addison. Secretary, F. Wood.

Mr. Wood decided that the names of Messrs. Lockwood, Howard and Earl be added to above officers to constitute Executive Committee.

A draft of by-laws was then submitted to the meeting and adopted. The object of which is as follows: 1. Bee-keepers may become members on payment of a fee of 50c. 2. A general meeting of the members shall be held once a year. 3. Time and place to be decided upon vote at previous meeting. 4. Three members shall constitute a quorum. 5. Vacancies by death or resignation to be filled by President. 6. President and Secretary shall have power to call special meetings. 7. Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer are defined. 8. Officers of association to be elected by open vote of members.

The following "charter members" were then enrolled: M. B. Holmes, Athens; F. L. Moore, Addison; John Kendrick, New Dublin; A. E. Earl, Fairfield East; W. Howard, Delta; Henry Hunt, Rockport; M. Lockwood, Philipville; W. D. Livingston, Frankville; F. L. Moore, Addison; J. C. Cook, Rockport; Fred S. Hayes, Athens; Horace Brown, Athens; A. C. Johns, Fairfield East; J. P. Mott, Rockport.

At the afternoon session the following letter of greeting from W. S. Hough, the well known apiarian, was read by G. F. Donnelly:

By unanimous vote it was decided that the next annual meeting be held in the town of Brockville.
