A WATCH'S WONDERS

The Mechanism of the Most Commo Article of Attire. Open your watch and look at the little

Open your watch and look at the little wheels, springs and screws, each an in-dispensable part of the whole wonderful machine. Notice the busy little balance wheel as it files to an fro unceasingly, day and night, year in and year out. This wonderful little machine is the re-sult of hundreds of years of study and ex-periment. The watch carried by the average man is composed of ninety-eight pieces, and its manufacture embraces more than 2,000-distinct and separate operations. Some of the smallest screws are ao minute that the unaided eye cannot operations. Some of the smallest screws are so minute that the unaided aye cannot distinguish them from steel filings or specks of dirt. Under a powerful mag-nifying glass a perfect screw is reveal-ed. The slit in the head is 2-1000 of an ed. The slit in the head is 2-1000 of an inch wide. It takes 306,000 of these screws to weigh a pound, and a pound is worth \$1,855. The hair-spring is a strip of the finest steel, about 94 inches long and 1-100 inch wide and 27.10,000 inch thick. It is colled up in a spiral form and finely tempered. The process of tempering these springs was long held as a sccret by the few fortunate ones possessing it, and even now is not-generally known." Their manufacture requires great skill and care. The strip is gauged to 20 1000 of an inch, but no measuring instrument has as yet been is gauged to 20 1000 of an inch, but no measuring instrument has as yet been adevised capable of fine enough gauging to determine beforehand by the size of the strip what the strength of the fin-ished spring will be. A 1:20,000 part of an inch difference in the thickness of the strip makes a difference in the run-ning of a watch of about six minutes per hour.

The value of these springs, when fin-ished and placed in watches, is enor-mous in proportion to the material from which they are made. A comparison will give a good idea. A ton of steel made up into hair-springs when in watches is worth more than twelve and one-half times the value of the same weight of pure gold. Hair-spring wire weighs one-twentieth of a grain to the inch. One mile of wire weighs less than half a pound. The balance gives five vibrations every second, 300 every minute, 18,000 every hour, 432,000 every day, and 157,680,000 every year. At each vibration it rotates about one and one-fourth times, which makes The value of these springs, when finand one-fourth times, which makes 197,100,000 revolutions every year. In order that we may better understand the stupend ount of labor performed by these tiny workers let us make a few comparisons. Take, for ill-ustration, a locomotive with six-foot driving wheels. Let its wheels be run until they have given the same number driving wheels. Let its wheels be full until they have given the same number of revolutions that a watch does in one year, and they will have covered a dis-tance equal to twenty-eight complete circuits of the earth. CAMPBELL PERJURY CASE.

Walter Campbell Convicted and Commit ted to Stand His Trial.

GEORGETOWN, March 5.-Walter Camp GRORGETOWN, March 5.—Walter Camp-bell appeared before the maxistrates on Saturday to answer to a charge of perjury. At the inquest held on January 29 over the body of the defendant's deceased bruther, Daniel. Walter Campbell swore that Alex. Tinning Cast Iron. A company in France tins cast iron by first covering it electrically with a coating of nickel and iron or cobalt and coating of nickel and iron or cobalt and by first covering it electrically with a coating of nickel and iron or cobalt and iron.
