FEW SHEETS

A Difference of Opinion over Them Caused Trouble and a Court Case Hangs Fire.

The patent medicine merchant visited the police station this morning and preferred a charge of assault against Mr. Garner. McDaniel claimed that he went to the house of Garner seeking lodgings and that he had objected to sleeping between sheets that anybody else had slept between before. Mr. Garner insinuated that the sheets he objected to were the three that the patent medicine man was fluttering in the wind. The latter insisted that he had had a couple of drinks but wasn't drunk. Judging by Mr. McDaniel's gore, which plentifully besprinkled the sidewalk in front of the Garner house, No. 2, the man of medicine did certainly embellish a portion of the town with a decidedly cardinal hue.
