NEW CORPS INSPECTED.

Col. Holmes Very Well Pleased
With the Progress Made.

The New Uniforms—Halifax Tweed
With Blue Facings—Trousers to
Have Red Stripes

Lt.-Col. Holmes, of London, District Officer Commanding, paid an official visit to the 24th Kent Regiment last evening. All the companies were represented at the drill shed and the regiment drilled under the command of Lieut.-Col. Rankin, the drill being followed by an inspection by the D. O. C.

Col. Holmes inspected the companies and regimental band and briefly addressed them. He complimented them on their appearance and the advance made in the matter of drill and gave the recruits several valuable suggestions.

At the conclusion of drill Colonel Holmes met the officers and discussed with them the equipment, clothing and color of uniform. He submitted four samples of Halifax tweed for the purpose of selecting the colors. The tunic, trousers and service caps will all be made of the same material, the all be made of the tunic to be blue and a red stripe down the seam of the trousers. He left sample for the regiment to select its own colors, and will send down the necessary requisition papers for clothing and other equipment to be filled out and forwarded to him.

The contractors are to be asked to proceed with the repairs and furnish the heating apparatus and wait until the next session of parliament, so that the necessary fund for payment may be included in the estimates.

WOMAN DENIED SHE WAS A WITCH

And Sued the Marmora Herald For Libel—Herald Won The Case In Two Courts.

The Divisional Court at Toronto yesterday dismissed an action brought by Elizabeth Booth, of King, against Editor Snell, of the Marmora Herald, for libel. The editor had alleged that the woman had been practicing witchcraft. The records showed that the plaintiff and her husband were accused before a magistrate of witchcraft, and aiding and abetting the same because of a magic crystal or mirror she possessed and described to the person from whom some grain had been stolen where it was stored; that she had admitted the offense and been fined \$30, including costs. The plaintiff was charged before the magistrate under Sec. 396, F. C., that "she did unlawfully pretend from her skill in an occult science to be able to locate stolen goods. She claimed to possess this gift from God through means not of a mirror but a diamond, admitted an offence, was fined, and brings the action because of being accused of witchcraft." The trial judge held that there was no offence by defendant in describing the proceedings in the police court and giving the technical name to such an occult science. The Divisional Court agreed with the trial judge, and dismissed the plaintiff's appeal.

KISS THAT COST ONE MAN'S LIFE.

It was Only in Fun but the Girl Stabbed Him With a Hat Pin for it.

Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 9.—The other day in Prescott, Walla Walla county, Frank Sloan in fun kissed Miss Ella Boone, who was blindfolded. She resented his action, and pulling a hat pin from her hat stabbed him in the leg. The pin was broken off in his leg, and blood poisoning resulted. Next day the pain became so intense that Sloan went to the hospital at Walla Walla. An X-ray machine failed to locate any signs of the pin and Sloan's condition grew worse. Miss Boone had remarked in Sloan's presence that she had never been kissed. This innocent remark led to Sloan's death.

DID HE CALL THE SOLDIERS CURS.

An Officer at Vancouver Said to Have Used Strong Language Towards Men Who did not Parade.

Vancouver, Jan. 9. — There is much friction in local military circles over the severe remarks of Major Bennett, of the Duke of Connaught's Own Rifles, in referring to the men who failed to obey orders in attending a thanksgiving service in Christ Church for the return of the South African soldiers. On returning from church soldiers to the drill hall Col. Wounop referred to the appearance of the men in complimentary terms, and handed them over to Major Bennett. Major Bennett only applied to those present, and not to absentees who, on account of a party snow storm and two feet of snow, declined to parade. He is reported to have said that they were fair weather soldiers, and that they were curs and a disgrace to the regiment. Such men as these were men that neither Canada nor the other country could rely upon in the hour of need, and if he had his way he would ask them for their uniforms. Major Bennett is the officer who has applied for a commission to raise a corps of police for South Africa.
