MURIEL FOSTER A GRAND SINGER.

Charmed a large Toronto audience last evening.
Miss Muriel Foster, the distinguished English contralto, who made so profound an impression when she sang here with the Albani Concert Company, re-appeared last night at Massey Hall in a recital in which she was assisted by Emile Renaud, solo pianist, who has been heard here on previous occasions, and Miss Kate Eadie, accompanist. Miss Foster, as is well known, has a beautiful voice, mellow, sympathetic and rich in color. She has, moreover, temperament while singing with artistic finish, which is something to be thankful for in these days when temperament is made to excuse so many crudities in singing. Among her selections were Goring Thomas' aria "My Heart is Weary," Franz's sombre but emotional "Im Herbst," Grieg's "Im Kahne," and songs of Olga Rudd, G. W. Cox and Del Riego. Miss Foster once more won a pronounced triumph, every number being greeted with enthusiastic applause. Mr. Renaud has developed in authority of interpretation and artistic repose and balance since he was first heard in Toronto. He won special successes in Chopin's Polonaise in A flat, and the Schütz paraphrase of the popular waltz song from Strauss' "Merry War." Miss Kate Eadie played the accompaniments unobtrusively, but with good judgment and taste.—Toronto Globe, Tuesday, April 19th.

THE REMEDY FOR SLAUGHTER.

The United States Steel Corporation has been trying to get a large supply of wire rods into Canada before the Sydney mill begins to produce. Hitherto the United States concern has had a whip to crack over the nail makers of Canada, and they are not disposed to give up this advantage without a struggle. Possibly they will meet the Canadian competition by slaughtering wire nails at less than cost as a penalty on the Canadian producers for buying rods at home. That would not be a legitimate commercial transaction, and if it is attempted it should be met by appropriate tariff legislation. Our axe makers have at various times paid a direct contribution in cash to foreign producers to hire them from slaughtering goods in this country below the cost of production. That is bad policy. The shipment of goods to this country at slaughter prices, which would not be accepted at home, is not trade. It is a conspiracy against Canadian industries, and should be met by treatment suited to such an offence.—St. John Sun.

Some Small Churches.

Wadsworth Church, where the tourists killed on Scafell are buried, is one of the smallest, if not actually the most diminutive, church in the kingdom. It measures only 30 feet by 14 feet, and as yet has only one tombstone. The lake district, as might be expected, possesses several diminutive churches. Among others the old Buttermere Church, between Derwentwater and Ennerdale, is very small, not capable of containing more than a dozen people. Near it is a new church, and, though the larger of the two, it only contains five pews on each side, with a square one at the end. There is another small church in Langdale, and a story is told that when Sir George Rose was dining on one occasion with the late Lord Langdale, patron of the living, mention was made of the building. "It is not bigger," said Lord Langdale, "than this dining-room." "No," returned Sir George, "and the living is not half so good."
