WIRELESS IN WARTIME

NOVEL MEANS OF TRANSMITTING NEWS FROM THE FAR EAST.

Interesting Questions Raised by Russia's Warning Against the System—The Station at Weihaiwei and the Press Boat Haimun—The De Forest System, Used There, Has an Element of Romance Connected With It.

Amid the bursting of shells, the sinking of battleships and the clash of armies in the Far East the noise of conflict is so great that it distracts the world's attention from an event of an importance almost equal to that of the contest itself—the introduction of wireless telegraphy in Japan. Not only are the Russian and Japanese ships equipped for sending and receiving messages, but news is being transmitted by "aerograms," some of the most thrilling stories of the struggle having been sent to the western world by means of the wireless telegraph.

The Russian fleet uses the Popoff system, which is kindred to that of Marconi. The Japanese have a system of their own, and Admiral Togo has used it on numerous occasions in giving orders to detached Japanese vessels. It was by the happy accident of intercepting a Japanese message that the Russian Vladivostok squadron was apprised

of the approach of the enemy and was thus enabled to escape in a fog. The really important use to which the wireless has been put, however, is in the sending of war news. The censor cannot "blue pencil" the air. Possibly this is the reason Russia has so vigorously protested against the use of the system, even going to the length of threatening to hang as a spy any correspondent found using the wireless. This warning, however, has caused little more than amusement. In the first place, it is not believed that the Czar's Government would go to the length of making the bluff good even if it had the power. In the second place, it has not the power. So long as Togo is abroad there is every probability that Russia's Port Arthur squadron will keep too close inside the protecting harbor to venture far in the pursuit of newspaper correspondents.

The story of the De Forest wireless telegraph, which is the system being used in the Far East news service, is not without an element of romance. Lee De Forest, the inventor, was an Iowa boy who worked his way through Yale, taking a special course in the study of the Hertzian wave theory, the principle on which the wireless is founded, and gaining the degree of Ph.D. for his mastery of the subject. Young De Forest then took an additional course in the Armour Institute of Chicago. At both institutions he spent a considerable portion of his time in working out an invention in the wireless system on which he had set his heart. He made his first outdoor experiments in Chicago and was so successful that he went to New York, where he met with the usual hard luck of the inventor. At last, however, he was successful in getting the United States Government to see the advantage of his system, and from that time he was a made man. He was only twenty-nine years of age at the time. The De Forest system differs radically from the Marconi in the substitution of a responder in place of the somewhat clumsy and uncertain coherer adopted by the Italian inventor. The responder, it is claimed, is more accurate, simpler and is capable of taking nearly three times as many words a minute as the Marconi system.

A short time before the outbreak of the war in the Far East Dr. De Forest was in England making some experiments in which Captain James, the famous newspaper correspondent, became interested. The upshot was that two of the outfits were ordered and sent to Yokohama. Hurrying to the east, Captain James chartered the Haimun as a press boat, and this was at once equipped for the wireless service. A station was then established at Wei-Hai-Wei, China, at which point Captain James established his headquarters. The station was located on a peninsula, and a bamboo mast 180 feet in height was erected. At first it was intended to place another station in Korea, but this idea was afterward abandoned, and messages instead were taken direct from the press boat, which has been accompanying the Japanese fleet. Messages are sent all the way from 50 to 150 miles. The system has been found to work perfectly. It is only against this service that the Russian Government issued its recent ukase.

WHAT GOVERNMENTS EXPEND.

Statement Compiled by the U.S. Department of Commerce and Labor.

The Department of Commerce and Labor of the United States, has compiled a statement, from which the following table is constructed, showing the per capita, of Government expenditures in leading countries of the world:

The showing of the department's statistics, condensed into a nutshell, is that in practically every country in the world, excepting China and India, with their teeming populations, the per capita of Government expenditures is greater than in the United States.

It is not to be overlooked, however, that the fact is by no means a demonstration that the people of that land carry a smaller tax-burden than their brethren of other nations. Governmental systems differ. Most foreign Governments have jurisdiction over many things that fall outside of the jurisdiction of the national Government of the United States. This is the result of the constitutional apportionment of power and responsibility between the Federal Government and the State Governments. In Great Britain no end of matters are within the purview of the National Government which in the United States belong to the Government of States, to the Government of cities, or to the Government of counties.

For this reason, the figures thus officially brought together are entertaining rather than practically important.

To Repair Ravages of Mice.

The Fruit Division, Ottawa, says that if the tree girdled by mice is only one or two years old, it will be better to replant. If older "bridges" in the bark may be made of sections of last year's growth may be resorted to. These should be about three inches longer than the width of the girdled section and the ends should be cut to a wedge shape. Then with a sharp, narrow chisel or other similar tool, slanting incisions should be made into the new wood above and below the wound, beginning near the edge of the bark, extending about an inch in length and penetrating a little into the wood. The sections should fit nicely into these incisions and be held in place by their own elasticity. Each end should then be covered with a small piece of grafting wax. Three or four sections will be sufficient for a tree less than six inches in diameter, and five or six for a large tree.

If the rough outer bark has been removed all around the tree, but some of the new wood or growing layer still remains fresh, the tree may often be saved by keeping the new wood moist till growth begins. This can be done by covering the wound with grafting wax or a mixture of clay and cow manure, equal parts. If the wound is low, a heap of earth will often be sufficient.

To Preserve Your Shoes.
Never try to wear a shoe too small or that does not fit when you first put it on.

There is no misery more distracting than a shoe that hurts the foot. Never let your shoes get hard and dry. Don't let them run over.

Don't let the heels run down.

Don't dry a wet shoe till you have rubbed it well with a flannel cloth and then with vasoline.

Never put shoes near the stove.

Half a peck of oats, kept in a small box, will be the very cheapest and best filling for a wet shoe. Fill the shoe and shake the oats down, after having rubbed and oiled it, and set it in a dry place to dry gradually. When dry pour the oats back for further use.

Take a wet rag and wash the shoe at least once a week, and oil overnight to keep in good condition.

Never handle patent leather until you have warmed it.

Never wear goloshes with good shoes.

"Le Quai des Grand Augustins."

He was educated at the University of Toronto, where he graduated B.A. in 1886. During his four years of student life he lived in the second house at the Residence, and, though of a somewhat reserved disposition, was highly appreciated by those who had the privilege of his acquaintance. Even in those days he devoted a great deal of time to drawing, and he was also a clever performer on the flute. Shortly after graduating he left for Europe to study art and has lived in Paris most of the time since.

WORTH KNOWING.

How to Cure Sore Feet—Some Other Valuable Remedies.

An eminent doctor recommends the following as a cure for sore feet: Alum, three ounces; tannin, one ounce; brown vinegar, one pint; rose water, half a pint. Mix and apply a little as a lotion after washing the feet.

A good recipe for insomnia is to slip a tumbler of hot milk before going to bed, as the milk and the heat thereby have a soothing effect and produce a drowsy sensation. A quick and effectual way to remove discoloration from bruises is to apply freely warm olive oil on cotton wool. Do not rub it in; simply apply it.

To cure inflamed eyelids bathe the eyes repeatedly in a solution composed of two teaspoonfuls of brandy added to a cup of tea. If it is possible, keep the eyes open once or twice while bathing them.

A small roll of paper or muslin placed above the first teeth under the upper lip and pressing hard upon the same will often arrest nose bleeding.

To stop hemorrhage of the lungs, wrap the thighs and arms above the elbows with small strong cords tightly drawn and tied. This will stop the flow of blood almost instantly.

A caraway seed between your teeth should not be tackled with a toothpick. Press your tongue firmly against one of the teeth next to which the seed is, avoiding the seed itself, or you would press it in more firmly, and you will find it fall.

A severe paroxysm of coughing may often be arrested by taking a tablespoonful of glycerin in a wineglassful of hot milk.

Morgan and the Snapshot Fiend.

Mr. Pierpont Morgan once entered a Law Court as a witness, when a photographer secured a flashlight photograph of him. Mr. Morgan, seeing what had happened, raised his cane involuntarily; then he thought better of it, and decided to resort to law. He demanded that the plate be broken then and there "in his presence," or he would do terrible things. The photographer demurred, but the millionaire was grimly rigid. "All right," said the man, and he brought out a plate from a holder, and broke it into pieces with many sighs. Next day Mr. Morgan's photograph appeared in gorgeous colorings in a daily paper. The plate broken was one on which another exposure had been made, not the one one which Mr. Morgan appeared.

Some Big Fillers.

Of birds now in existence probably the one with the greatest expanse of wing in proportion to the body and with the greatest power of flight is the frigate or man-of-war bird. This bird apparently flies without any apparent effort, by skill than by strength, for it has no great carrying powers. The wandering albatross, the largest of all sea birds, is also one of our strongest fliers. One bird was known to fly in a direct line for one hundred miles at least, 3,150 miles in twelve days. This bird was caught, tagged, released and caught again.
