Toronto, Oct. 11.—Fred Wyle, who in July was sent to the Central from Port Hope for one year for passing bogus cheques, was yesterday in court to answer other charges. Hamilton, Brantford and St. Catharines have charges to register also. Yesterday he was accused of getting \$1 and a razor from John M. White by false pretences. He pleaded intoxication and an earnest intention to mend his ways, but he goes back to the Central for 15 months.

Defaulters Surrender.
Peoria, Ill., Oct. 11.—Newton S. Dougherty, former bank president and defaulting school superintendent, against whom ninety-seven indictments for forgery and embezzlement were returned Monday, drove to the jail, surrendered himself to the sheriff and was locked up.

Captain Gets \$50.
Kingston, Oct. 11.—Capt. Crawford yesterday secured a verdict in the High Court for \$50 for wrongful dismissal in May last from the command of the steamer Wolfe Island.

Admiral Saco Dead.
Tokio, Oct. 11.—Admiral Saco, inspector-general of naval construction, is dead. His death is deeply lamented in naval circles as a heavy loss to the nation.

THE GLORIOUS VICTOR

Man Who Kept His Word Eulogized in Montreal.

Welcome Accorded to Hon. Mr. Whitney by French-Canadians That Might Turn Any Man's Head—Premier's Reply Contained a Pleasant Surprise In That He Opened With French Sentence.

Montreal, Oct. 11.—"The glorious victor who kept his word and who personifies in his province the sound Conservative traditions of 1854." This is what the Jacques Cartier Club says of Premier Whitney, who received a welcome last evening that might turn any man's head. Dr. Bernard presided and at the table of honor were seated: Messrs. Whitney, Monk, Day, Beaulieu, Desjardins, Marcey, Marchal, Leclerc, M. P.; Reaume, Dr. Wilson, Bergeron, Chapais, Leblanc and many other representative Conservatives from both provinces, while 250 more were seated at the side tables. Certainly no Ontario statesman has ever received such a welcome at the hands of Quebec.

R. L. Borden wired: "Greatly regret my inability to be present. Permit me, however, to join most sincerely in equal tribute of respect and admiration to your distinguished guest."

A letter read from ex-Provincial Secretary George P. Graham, Brockville, said: "It is particularly gratifying to me to receive this invitation, as my first political battle was in defence of the rights of the minority in Ontario, and I have ever adhered to that principle, believing that toleration and respect for the opinions of others forms the only solid basis for a permanent nationality. It is a pleasure to know that outside a few demagogues this spirit now predominates the entire Ontario Legislature. I see in the courtesy extended to Premier Whitney a token of this growing friendship between the provinces and trust nothing may even occur to retard the development of this spirit."

F. Monk of Jacques Cartier proposed the health of the Premier of Ontario as "the true representative of tolerant English-speaking Canada. All that we need," Mr. Monk added, "is to know each other better." No party, he declared, could run to victory in this country who failed to build on the same basis as the British Empire.

Mr. Whitney replied in his hearers by a few words in French, and said it would require several languages to express his gratitude towards those before him. Such occasions come to a man but once in his life. He extolled the brother of Sir John Macdonald. They saw that the British Empire was the system for Canada and became invincible. "Why am I here," he asked, "is it because I keep my word? Perhaps there is nothing strange in that, for honesty is the best policy. Is it because I speak for a sentiment which has stood by the liberties of Canada?" He then referred to the battle at the polls which ended in the return of the Conservative party, and gave a history of the carnage of crime, carried on in the interest of the late Government. He was proud, too, to belong to the Conservative party of Canada, the party that stood for everything.

The Premier then spoke of the respect he had for Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Quebec was right in being proud of him, yet he knew that Quebec would condemn the Liberal leader when he went wrong.

The Future of Both.
Speaking of the Federal leader, Mr. Whitney said he asked Mr. Borden to remain in public life and that the party would rally around him, and that he would lead them to victory. The voice of the demagogue would be heard in Quebec and Ontario. Leave them there. Perhaps Providence allows them to stay as a warning. We were separate as the illies were separate, and were one as the seas. The people of Ontario had not forgotten the great day of Chateaugay and Deserresburg. Mr. Whitney spoke of the English and French, who fought at Crysler Farm and foretold that both races would fill important parts in this Canada.

The health of Hon. Dr. Reaume, which was proposed by L. T. Marchal, was responded to in an eloquent speech. The Legislature of Ontario was responded to by J. B. Lucas, M. P., for Grey Centre. Hon. J. J. Roy proposed the Legislature of Quebec, which was responded to by Hon. P. E. Leblanc. Speeches were also made by Hon. Thos. Chapais and J. G. H. Bergeron, M. P.'s.

SIR WM. MULOCK RESIGNS.

Postmaster-General Leaves Sir Wilfrid—Aylesworth to Succeed.

Ottawa, Oct. 11.—(Globe Special)—Sir William Mulock, Postmaster-General, is retiring from the Cabinet, primarily, it is said, on account of his health. His resignation is believed to be in the hands of the Prime Minister and will be accepted by the latter with extreme reluctance. Indications point strongly to Mr. A. B. Aylesworth, K. C., as Sir William's successor. The Governor-General returns to the city on Sunday or Monday.

Earl Grey Entertained.

Winnipeg, Oct. 11.—The Canadian Club entertained Earl Grey to luncheon yesterday at the Manitoba Hall, covers being laid for 600 guests, among those present being Chief Justice Killam, Attorney-General Campbell, C. C. Chipman, Rev. C. W. Gopbell (Ralph Conner), Col. Evans, Mayor Sharpe, and J. A. M. Atkins, president.

Earl Grey spoke of the non-partisan character of the Canadian Club and advantages ensuing therefrom, and concluded by paying tribute to the great future of Winnipeg.

Baptist Bodies Unite.

St. John, N. B., Oct. 11.—One of the most momentous events in the religious history of New Brunswick took place yesterday, when the organic union of the Maritime Baptists and the New Brunswick Free Baptist bodies was consummated. After seventy-three years of separate existence the two have decided to come together again.

THACKERY TRIES SUICIDE.

Toronto Man Slashes His Neck and Wrist in Jail at Detroit.

Detroit, Oct. 11.—Monday a man about 30 years of age, who gave his name as George Thackery, and later as George Stephenson, and said that his parents live at 215 Chestnut street, Toronto, was fined six months in the House of Correction for disorderly conduct.

Monday night he was found in his cell bleeding from wounds in the neck and wrist. He held a razor in his hand and tried anyone to approach him. He was overpowered and placed in the hospital ward. He had cut himself severely, but not dangerously. He got the razor from the officials while they were handed out to prisoners who wished to shave themselves, and then hid it away.

Referred to Mr. Schrieber.

Ottawa, Oct. 11.—Hon. H. R. Emmerson has referred the plans of the route of the Grand Trunk Pacific from the Toronto Hills to Edmonton to Mr. Schrieber. These plans were filed with the Minister about a week ago. Mr. Schrieber leaves to-day to go over the proposed route.

Hanged Himself.

Toronto, Oct. 11.—Thomas Hurst hanged himself in the Gardener's Lodge at the Toronto General Hospital during Monday night, and the body was found yesterday morning. Fear that he was to lose his right arm by amputation is thought to have induced the deed.

Finlay and Grant Released.

Ottawa, Oct. 11.—Finlay and Grant, the Canadians seized on a Japanese coasting vessel by the Russians during the war, have been released, according to advices received from Downing street.

Former M. P. Dies.

Montreal, Oct. 11.—The death took place at the home for incurables, Notre Dame De Grace, of Stephen Tobin, a former mayor of Halifax, and a member of Parliament. He was 74 years old.

Snow in Winnipeg.

Winnipeg, Oct. 11.—The first snow of the season fell yesterday morning.
