SOME GARDEN NOTES

Vegetables intended for keeping through the winter may now be planted or sown.

Cabbages, i. e., early varieties should now be set out, but late varieties can be kept back a little while longer and would perhaps be the better for a wait or they may get too forward.

We can go on planting lettuce, radishes, cress, endive or summer salads. If the esery plants are ready they can now be set out in the trenches but these should be well watered before the planting is done.

Cauliflowers can be set out, and a few plants can be put out each week, so that all will not head the same week and so come in all at once. Wrapping the stems with coarse brown paper, for an inch under ground and an inch or two above, will protect them from cut worms.

Some of the quick growing annuals can still be sown in the flower garden and it may not be too late even for some sweet peas. June is the most vigorous growing month we have, so look after the weeds.

Rhubarb is growing fast, it needs loose ground round it and lots of water, otherwise it may be stunted and small.

Do not imagine because the early seeds did not do well that you cannot have a garden this year. There is a good chance to grow a lot of vegetables from seed sown now and perhaps this will beat those grown from seed sown much earlier.

Poison cut worms with sweetened bran dipped in a weak solution of Paris Green.

Get after the potato bugs early and lessen the hatching of their eggs then there will not be so many to destroy later.

When the potatoes have peeped through early draw the dirt up around them, and, if very early, throw a little dirt or dust on the leaves for it wards off some of the frost. This is not too late to plant for winter potatoes.

"The early bird gets the worm." The early worm in this country often gets the early garden so look out for him, and if the garden is not coming sow again while the worm is in a crystal state.
