OTTAWA, March 7.—The motion of the minister of justice yesterday afternoon for a committee to investigate and report upon the insolvent laws, produced a debate which lasted all the afternoon. Mr. Mills was good enough to open the debate. Within a short line, however, prices have improved, and there has been an advance amounting to about ten cents a bushel. It is not probable that fall prices will be reached, however, and a new set of faces among dealers is looked for on this side next season. The reasons for this decline are probably various, but it is likely that the prominent one is the increasing use of State barley, which is improving in quality until it nearly approaches the Canadian, and is held at lower prices. The following fagures show the total importation of barley from the years named—being the imports from all norts along the great American lakes, from Ogdensburgh, to Chicago: 1878, 4,389,351: 1876, 6,825,082; 1876, 7,521,382; 1875, 8,236,282.
