BOXING TOURNAMENT TROPHIES ON EXHIBITION

The gym of the Western Pastime Club is a busy place these days with the entries in the big amateur boxing tournament to be staged on May 10th, rounding themselves into form for their respective bouts.
 The entry list is very large, including the best amateur boxers of Langford, South Wellington, Victoria and Nanaimo, and keen competition is assured for the handsome trophies to be awarded the winners in the several classes. Several of the cups to be competed for will be placed on exhibition in Foreman's window. It does not need a second glance to assure one of the value of these trophies for the possession of which many strenuous bouts will be waged, and the followers of the ring game in this district can rest assured of a big night of sport on the tenth.
 The promoters are offering a cup for competition among the newsboys of the city, and those who wish to enter for this trophy are asked to see Instructor Tommy Moore at the Western Pastime Club without delay.

REVIVAL OF BUILDING ACTIVITY IS FORECASTED

All over the United States the spring will witness a revival of building activity. Extensive Federal and State plans for the provision of "buffer employment" are under way. The Bureau of Public Roads estimates 1919 expenditures for roads and bridges at \$385,000,000; while during the next three years, according to the terms of the Federal Aid Road Act, the Government, co-operating with the various states, will have a total of at least \$574,000,000 for road building. The Federal Government has voted an extra appropriation of \$209,000,000 for this suggested highway construction. The growth of the "Own Your Own Home" movement is indicated in a statement from the Labor Department that twenty cities are now engaged in such campaigns.

British manufacturers are alive to the value of industrial research, and valuable work has already been done in many directions. In the glass industry the ingredients required for the manufacture of optical glass, hitherto made at Jena, have been defined. In addition to this three completely new glasses, previously unobtainable, have been discovered. Something like \$100,000 has been spent in the past three years on work in this department, and in the coming year another \$150,000 will be spent on grants to individual students and workers. In the pottery trade a new ware has been discovered, also a new cheap glass which will enable the British trade to hold its own with the hard porcelains produced in Germany and Austria.

Vancouver has been selected as the meeting place on May 14 for the session of the provincial grand lodge of the Knights of Pythias, which ranks as the third largest fraternal society in the Dominion. This is a change in the location of the gathering which was originally planned for Nelson but, in order to provide for the greater convenience of the delegates from the 42 districts to be represented, Vancouver was chosen. It is altogether likely that the Grand Lodge of Pythian Sisters will also meet in Vancouver at the same time.

PRIVATE HODGE APPOINTED

Victoria, May 1.—Private G. C. Hodge, formerly a member of the Seventh Battalion, has been appointed by the Provincial Government to the position of travelling representative for the Provincial Returned Soldiers' Commission, with headquarters in Vancouver.



The Red Triangle has been with the Canadian Army from the first from Valcartier to the Rhine. During demobilization we have maintained full service to the soldiers both in Canada and overseas, and we will continue to do so until demobilization is completed—if you help us.

But please note that for the military work in Europe this year you are not asked for further contributions. The gradual liquidation of assets overseas will suffice to maintain full service while the soldiers remain. The war work you are asked to support this year is for the soldiers coming home.

What We Are Doing for Returning Soldiers

At Ports and on Trains
 On every troop ship a trained Y.M.C.A. man is on duty. He carries a supply of literature, writing materials, games, a magic lantern and slides, a gramophone and records. In some cases he has a piano or an organ.

For Soldiers' Wives and Children
 Out of the Red Triangle Fund \$175,000 will be set aside for the Dominion Council of the Young Women's Christian Association, who are looking after soldiers' wives and children coming to Canada. Y.W.C.A. secretaries help mothers on boats, and render to the women and children a service similar to that which the Y.M.C.A. does for the men. Y.W.C.A. rest rooms and refreshment service welcome the soldiers' families at the ports of arrival. The sick are attended, children cared for, and the women folk cheered with the kindly word and the helping hand. At the big railway stations the Y.W.C.A. representatives are there to help, comfort, advise and direct. And in certain cases, where money is lacking, funds are provided to complete the journey. The budget of the Dominion Council, Y.W.C.A. provides also for the extension of its many forms of service among Canadian girls.

In Military Hospitals
 In each of the military hospitals in Canada, in the military camps and barracks where men remain on duty during demobilization, the Y.M.C.A. place a trained man in charge of full Red Triangle service, providing entertainment, recreation, instruction and social stimulus.

For Coming Men of Canada
 The Y.M.C.A. asks your support for a greatly enlarged programme of service to Canada's boys this year, as the most valuable reconstructive work that can be done to repair the awful war-wastage of Canada's man power (60,383 dead and 156,799 wounded).
 The Red Triangle will be carried to the boys and men of the towns and villages and the open country this year, upon a plan of county organization. You are asked to help construct the manhood that will reconstruct Canada.

For Soldiers of Industry
 Something of what the Y.M.C.A. is doing for the soldiers in khaki, will be done this year for the army of workers in Canada's industrial plants. A programme of social activities and recreation will be promoted under the guidance of trained Y.M.C.A. men.
 The Y.M.C.A. is establishing Red Triangle service also for the men and boys in the "front trenches of industry"—workers in isolated industries like lumbering and mining.
