## Trade and Industry.

—Messrs. Blenkhorn & Sons,  
edge tool manufacturers, of Canine,  
N. S., manufactured 1,200 dozen  
axes last year.

—The amount of coal shipped  
from Cape Breton and Pictou to  
Montreal in 1883 was 888,412 tons,  
an increase of 62,445 tons over the  
amount shipped in 1882.

—Messrs. W. H. Moore & Co., of  
North Sydney, C. B., have assigned.  
Liabilities, \$85,000. Total assets,  
\$75,000. The difficulties of the firm  
are ascribed to severe losses by fire  
in 1881, which, with recent losses,  
have made it difficult to meet their  
obligations.

—The total registered tonnage of  
the Maritime Provinces at the close  
of 1883 was as follows:—

—Mr. F. W. Chipman, dry goods  
merchant, of Kentville, N. S., has  
assigned. Liabilities, \$55,000, of  
which a considerable portion is  
secured. Mr. Chipman claims to  
have assets to the value of \$70,000.  
The failure is ascribed to the great  
difficulty of collecting debts on ac-  
count of the partial failure of the  
apple-crop, and want of a market  
for the large crop of potatoes  
raised last year.

—From a report, published by  
the St. John Globe, we learn that  
the number of vessels now building in  
New Brunswick is thirty-four. Of  
this number 8 are ships, 2 are barques,  
4 are brigantines, 19 are schooners  
or woodboats, and there is one tug-  
boat. The ships will average nearly  
1,500 tons each—the largest being  
1,600 tons and the smallest 1,400  
tons. The largest schooner will  
register 300 tons.

—The number of vessels now  
building or under contract in Nova  
Scotia is 107, aggregating 56,040  
tons. The list includes 1 steamer,  
1 tug-boat, 23 ships, 8 barques, 1  
brigantine, 1 brig, 1 brigantine and  
71 schooners. A comparison with  
the list of vessels registered in 1883  
shows a large increase of tonnage,  
but a considerable falling off in  
number, and indicates a tendency  
towards building large vessels. For  
instance, two of the ships now build-  
ing will register about 21,000 tons  
each, one is put down at 2,000 tons  
and three at 1,800, while the smallest  
will measure 1,300 tons.

—The barques are also large, all but  
two being of 1,000 tons or upward. Some  
of the schooners are small, as might  
be expected, but there is one 700  
tons, another nearly as large, while  
half a dozen more range from 300  
to 500 tons. It is quite probable that  
the number of vessels in course of  
construction will be increased during  
the year.

—The following comparative  
statement of the shipments of coal  
from the collieries of Nova Scotia  
and Cape Breton during the years  
1882 and 1883 is given by the  
toll-tollers of the "Journal." It will  
be noticed that the shipments from  
Spring Hill are much larger than  
from any other mine in the  
Province:—

—In the current number of the  
Fortnightly Review one Sir Lepel  
Griffin in an article headed *A Visit  
to Philistia* gives us his views on  
America and American affairs at  
large. He can think of no country,  
he says, except Russia, "in which  
life would not be more worth living,  
less sordid and mean and unenjoy-  
able, and less full of the elements of  
social failure." What this gallant  
knight's ideal of life may be we do  
not know, but we can readily con-  
ceive from the tone of the article  
that a given condition of social ex-  
istence might fail to meet his proba-  
tion and yet be worth living by  
people of sense. And as to the  
failure of Republican institutions, it  
seems to us preposterous in the last  
degree to attach the name of failure  
to a system under which fifty-five  
millions of people live peaceably  
and in the enjoyment of a degree of  
comfort very far indeed above that  
attained to on the average on the  
other side of the water. Defects  
there undoubtedly are connected  
with the American system of gov-  
ernment, and we have often enough  
pointed them out in the columns of  
the Post, but when judged as a  
whole, looked at in its relations to  
all classes of society, it most as-  
toundingly would be immeasurably  
nearer the truth to say that Republi-  
can institutions were a complete  
success than to stigmatize them as a  
failure.

—Acquiescence in the standard  
time has been so far broken by but a  
single voice. That comes from the  
Mayor of Bangor, Maine, who re-  
fuses to heed the resolution of the  
Commerce Council on the subject  
of the petition of the people of  
Maine who is the chief official. He  
says that standard time is an at-  
tempt to change the laws of God,  
that it is "a manifest injustice to  
all laborers and mechanics," and  
that it "teaches wholesale fraud and  
deception."
