

#### MAY BLOCK TREATY.

French Senate Opposed to Preferential Trade.

Ottawa, June 29.—Advises received from Paris by the Government indicate that there is a strong probability of the French Senate declining to ratify the Franco-Canadian trade convention unless some modifications are made to it. Some opposition has arisen to the treaty among the agriculturalists of France, who fear the increased competition from Canada under the special preference granted by the treaty to Canadian products. Despite the criticisms of the Opposition to the provisions of the treaty when it was before the Commons, and their argument that Canada was reaping no very substantial benefit, it now appears that in France the opinion prevails that Hon. Messrs. Brodeur and Fielding negotiated a treaty that was unduly favorable to Canada.

Another reason that militates against the ratification of the treaty at present is the fact that negotiations are now on between France and the United States, looking to the passing of a trade treaty between the two Republics, and the French Senate fears that the concessions granted Canadian manufacturers in some lines and to Canadian agricultural products may be

made the basis of demands by the American Government in drafting the new treaty.

The French Senate adjourns for two months on July 1.

#### WILL RETURN HOME.

Wife of Saskatchewan Man to be Deported From Detroit.

Windsor, June 29.—Mary Ellen Warnock, wife of Patrick Warnock, of Antlers, Saskatchewan, who followed Samuel Scott to this country and admitted that she had been "harbored" by him when Scott was tried before a Federal jury, charged with maintaining an alien woman in Detroit, will be deported to Canada on Friday by the immigration authorities. She was arrested several months ago and has spent the time since in the county jail.

A letter has been received by the immigration officers from Patrick Warnock, who simply says, "Please send my wife home to me." Scott was acquitted and is now working in Detroit. Mrs. Warnock declares she is overjoyed at the opportunity of returning home.

#### FERNLEIGH

Bowling Green and Club Will be Opened To-morrow.

To-morrow afternoon at 2 o'clock the formal opening of the Fernleigh Bowling Club, at the corner of Mountain and Aberdeen avenues, will take place. Mr. A. W. Semmens, the Honorary President, will conduct the ceremony, and after that the day will be an open one for the members of the club and their friends.

There are twelve bowling greens and two tennis courts, making it one of the largest bowling greens in Canada. The nearest approach to the size of the Fernleigh's green is the one in Owen Sound, and it is ten feet short of the measurements of the local green.

There will be club rink matches all day and in the evening. Refreshments will be served and a thoroughly enjoyable time is anticipated.

#### DEATH FOR SIX.

Result of Trial of Thirty-Six Revolutionists in Montenegro.

Cettinje, June 29.—The trial of 36 prisoners charged with revolutionary activity in connection with the discovery of a score of bombs here last year, and at which sensational testimony was adduced, involving Crown Prince George of Serbia in a conspiracy against Montenegro, has resulted in six of the accused being condemned to death, three to life imprisonment, and twenty-seven, including five former Cabinet Ministers, to terms of imprisonment ranging from six to twenty years.

#### TO PROMOTE VICE.

Winnipeg Police Claim to Have Evidence of Organized Ring.

Winnipeg, June 29.—The police claim to have established proof that an organized ring or trust is in existence to finance and promote traffic in social vice, with ramifications extending through many western cities. The women simply go in circuits. When they are chased out of one town they have another place waiting where furnished quarters are at their disposal. The representative of the trust here is well known to the police.

#### ITALIANS ARRESTED.

They Were Organizing Black Hand Society at Fernie.

Fernie, B. C., June 29.—The arrest of eleven Italians was made this morning. They are supposed to be trying to organize a Black Hand Society here. It appeared that the secret was given away by someone who had been approached to join. More arrests are likely to follow.
