NEW SERVICE FROM TORONTO TO NEW YORK CITY

The Grand Trunk Railway inaugurated on May 4th, 1919, a through train service from Toronto to New York City, leaving Toronto 5.45 p.m.; St. Catharines 7.50 p.m. daily, arriving New York at Pennsylvania Terminal 9th St. and 7th Ave. Train handles through coaches and sleeping cars Toronto to New York, also coaches and parlor car Toronto to Buffalo, dining car Toronto to Niagara Falls.

Also train leaving St. Catharines 6.03 p.m. daily runs through to Buffalo, making direct connections at Buffalo for New York, coaches and parlor-library buffet car Toronto to Buffalo, sleeping cars Buffalo to New York and Philadelphia.

The Pennsylvania Station is so centrally located that it is a great convenience to the visitor to New York, and is in easy reach of some of the latest hotels, also the shopping and theatre districts. With the opening of the new tunnel under the East River, Brooklyn passengers arriving at or departing from this station in New York now have direct tube service to and from Brooklyn through the 7th Ave. Subway. Through trains are now running between Pennsylvania Station and Atlantic Ave. Station, Brooklyn by way of 7th Ave. Hudson St., West Broadway, Park Place, Beckman St., William St., and the new tube to Clark and Henry Streets (Brooklyn Heights) Borough Hall and Atlantic Ave. Brooklyn.

KOLCHAK NOW RECOGNIZED AS THE LEADER

Onisk Dictator Acknowledged by Archangel Government as Chief of all Russia.

Archangel, May 9.—The Provisional Government of North Russia has officially recognized an declared allegiance to the Onisk Government, pending the establishment of closer connections with Onisk, the Provisional Government reserves independent management of local affairs.

Kolchak's Progress.
London, May 9.—Admiral Kolchak, head of the Onisk Government, continues his successful offensive operations, according to a report received from Onisk dated April 29. In the Simbirsk region the Siberian forces, in active pursuit of the Bolsheviks, have occupied a number of places west of the station of Szentala. In the north the capture is announced of the town of Sergieffsk, the last place the Bolsheviks can make a stand until Samara is reached.

South of the Kazan-Yekaterinburg Railway the Reds are retreating, closely pursued by the Serbians, who have captured several towns and considerable war material.

Admiral Kolchak has also captured Christopol, on the Kama, taking steamers, guns, and large supplies of ammunition.

BACK IN CANADA

Mrs. Harry Greene, Church Street, received a telegram this morning from her son Gummer Frank Greene of the 7th Siege Battery stating that he had arrived at Halifax and expected to be home on Monday.

Gunner Greene enlisted in 1915 and went overseas in March 1916 with the 2nd Battery. He was wounded a year ago last March.
