The system of selling the poor by suction still prevails in Digby, N. S. It is worked in this fashion: A person as unable to support bimself. The county authorities immediately advertise that he is for sale. That is to say, tise that he is for sale. That is to say, the county amounces its readiness to receive offers for his support, the county to pay the amount per month specified by the successful tenderer, and the tenderer to take the pauper, feed him and make whatever he can out of him. The lowest tenderer gets the pauper. Sam Slick inverghed against this system years ago, describing it as the white slave system, and latterly attempts have been made, but without success, to abolish it. In view of the abuses said to have orept in under it, a commission has been appointed to enquire into it. The report of this body will be looked for with interest, as will also the action which may possibly follow it.
