He was educated at Eaton and Oxford, whence he graduated in 1831, taking a double first class. He was first elected to Parliament, as a Conservative, in 1832. He entered Lincoln's Inn, for the study of the law, in 1833; but after six years, he petitioned to have his name removed from the books of the Society, on the ground that he had abandoned the purpose of being called to the bar. In 1834, Mr. Gladstone was appointed a junior lord of the treasury in the Government of Sir Robert Peel, and in 1835, he was made under Secretary for Colonial affairs. The Peel ministry was defeated in April of the same year, and Mr. Gladstone retired from office in April of the same year, and at midnight,
