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LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

At the meeting of the board on Friday last, all the shares issued for 12 1/2-10 cts. per lb.

The Steamer Leifvick has set down her passengers to 4 days and 14 hours.

The first official passenger train to travel over the C. T. F. Westward, went out from Pictou to Pictou, N. B. Friday with 20 American soldiers on board.

Three men were killed at Regis, N. B., on the 25th, while standing on a side track. One was a passenger and the other two were a gang of men. They supposed that a certain train would take the main line, but instead the train came down the siding and before the men could get clear of the tracks all three were killed.

A large barn belonging to Mr. Charles Owen, Georgetown, was destroyed by fire Friday morning. The barn was full of hay and also contained some farming implements, a building machine, and other things which were lost. The house adjoining was only saved by the most strenuous work.

Bartholomew, Mrs. Martin's wife of the Post Office at Montserrat, was fatally burned while preparing dinner. In some way her clothing caught fire about the kitchen stove, and she ran out. The wind fanned the flames and before help arrived she was so badly burned that she died in a couple of hours.

Windward advice of the 25th report remarkable changes in the temperature in 24 hours. On the 25th, the temperature changed from 80 to almost the freezing point. Two degrees of frost were registered on the 26th and 27th. The prevailing wind was from the north, with 35 at Montserrat and 35 at the station.

A Windward dispatch of the 25th says: Magnificent harvest weather prevails, and everything should be general next week. Lord Lovat, who came over from Scotland to be present at the Quebec Tercentenary celebration as a representative of the Fraser family, has presented to the Dominion of Quebec a beautiful painting representing his distinguished ancestor, then Capt. The remains of Hugh Jennings, formerly of Byng's farm, who died at Bridgewater, N. S., were brought to the Island yesterday. The casket was in the hands of the undertaker, and was forwarded to Pictou's Station by train. Deceased had been living with members of his family in the States; but desired to be buried here where he had spent the greater part of his life. R. I. P. Ordinary notice later.

Advice from Wigan, England, says: The worst fears have been realized in an explosion which occurred in Wigan mine yesterday. The exploded number numbered about 70, and it is impossible that any of them can have survived. Efforts at rescue, however, continue. Thirty bodies were discovered yesterday in the workings; but the bodies from the burning coal prevented the rescuers from reaching others that are undoubtedly lying far down in the mine.

Advice of the 25th from Victoria, B. C. says: Numerous settlements are now being threatened and several lumber camps have already been destroyed. In the Kootenai district a territory twenty square miles in extent has been burned. The flames are now advancing. The eastern side of Bowen Island is all ablaze and the fate of eighty odd persons in the vicinity is unknown. Some of the richest lumber lands in the province have been swept away by the fire, which can only be checked now by heavy rain.

A dispatch of the 19th from Mexico City says: The great fire which has been raging in the city since Tuesday for forty-three days has baffled all attempts to extinguish it, and it is now greater in volume than ever before. From a whole city has been reduced to a heap of ruins. The fire is now spreading to the suburbs, and the fate of the city is uncertain. The report received today from the Mexican Government estimated the amount of oil consumed at 10,000 gallons a minute.

The Foster meeting at Montserrat last evening was one of the grandest ever held in this Province. The large new hall, just fitted up by the owner, Mr. D. L. McKinnon, was crowded to the doors, and many were unable to gain admission. There must have been over sixteen hundred people in the hall; and on the extensive stage about one hundred and fifty ladies occupied seats. The best of order prevailed and the magnificent demonstration closed with ringing cheers, again and again repeated. This splendid demonstration surely shows how the political wind blows in King's County.
