Holt, who shot J. P. Morgan on Saturday, committed suicide Tuesday night by jumping from the jail window to the concrete floor in the court yard fifty feet below.

General Porfirio Diaz, former President of Mexico, died in Paris Friday morning. General Diaz had been in failing health since reaching Europe in 1911 after his resignation from the presidency of Mexico, following the successful Madero revolution.

The Militia Department Ottawa, received news of the safe arrival of the C. P. R. liner, Missinabi at Plymouth on Saturday. On board where the Canadian Dental Corps, a company each from the 88th (Ottawa), 47th (Vancouver) battalions and 39th (Belleville) battalion complete.

The cargo of a German steamer confiscated at Naples includes half a million revolvers, 100,000 rifles, 200,000 cases of ammunition, four aeroplanes, fourteen field guns and two wireless stations. The steamer had been interned and the find was made under merchandise.

Fifty sticks of dynamite in a wooden box buried under the earth, were discovered last Wednesday night in Saw Park. Lewis P. Q. close to the Mercier machinery shops, which is to receive a contract from the British Government for ammunition. The Militia Department in Quebec was informed and an investigation was immediately started.

Seven persons were killed and ten more injured by an explosion of cordite Tuesday morning at the Plant of the Canadian Explosives at Belœil, 25 miles from Montreal. The explosion was caused, it is thought, by a young German who was formerly employed there, but recently discharged.

It is understood that the contract for the transportation of the million bushels of wheat from the head of the lakes to Montreal en route to New Zealand by the Canadian Pacific. Tenders for the transportation of the grain to Montreal were asked for, and a number of lake and rail transportation companies tendered. The price quoted by the C. P. R. is said to be unprecedentedly low.

A gold vase standing more than two feet high, the gift of King George to the yachtsmen of America was received at the British Embassy Washington, on the 2nd, from London and forwarded to the Panama-Pacific where it will be one of the prizes in aquatic contests. On it is inscribed, "Presented by King George V. to the Panama-Pacific International Exposition Regatta 1915.

The Toronto Globe on Saturday had the following from Windsor, Ont.—Major S. C. Robinson, commanding the 21st Regiment here, received a communication warning him that 1,000 Germans proposed to come over the Detroit River at some unspecified point on Sunday night next, and raid Canadian territory. "Let them come," was the officer's response. "I can assure them there is not one of them will ever get back."

The dredge Edwin Hall, engaged at Southport on the site of the proposed marine slipway met with an accident on Saturday night, capsizing. It is stated that when the tide receded the dredge was drawn too near to the cut which she had made and with the weight of the large dipper, canted over and filled with water. The watchman on board had a narrow escape from drowning. It is believed the dredge can be raised without difficulty.

Major General Sam Hughes, Canadian Minister of Militia, left Ottawa Friday afternoon for New York, whence he sailed for England on Saturday. General Hughes is going over to inspect the second Canadian division at Shorncliffe and transact pending business with the War Office. He will also likely visit the Canadians in France. Hon. Senator J. A. Longhead, Minister without portfolio and leader of the Government in the Upper House, will be acting Minister of Militia in the General's absence.
