EXPERIMENTS IN AGRICULTURE.
A few weeks ago attention was called to Oregon's 1912 crop of the beetroot, a combination of the beet and potatoe, said to be very prolific and of delicious flavour. Now comes news that the United States Government, Department of Agriculture, has imported from China a new variety of cabbage which has wonderful possibilities. The new cabbage is not sown until the first week in August, allowing the grower time to raise a crop of spinach or snap beans on the same soil, but it heads in November, the same as ordinary cabbage. It is not so solid as ordinary cabbage, but the very delicacy of its leaves makes it better for cold slaw and sauerkraut and it is entirely odorless while being cooked. Within the same week in which

the foregoing was published, appeared a news item from St. Paul stating that as a result of chemical soil analysis in the greenhouses of James J. Hill, it is believed that the production of wheat, oats and barley can be doubled. Other dispatches report that meal made from alfalfa has been found excellent for human food. Bur

Union is strength.

Morris is making good with the grabbers.

"An able and honest Colonial Statesman, sufficiently independent in point of wealth to be able to resist the inducements of rich capitalists." That is Sir Robert Bond.

Where are the Bait Depots that Sir Edward Morris was going to establish all round the coasts at places easily accessible to fishermen?

The Fishermen, the Farmers, the Mechanics, the Labourers, and all who work for a living, who were to find a rallying point under the banner of the People's Party are now lined up against the Morris Party in their tens of thousands. Thousands who voted for that Party last elections are now waiting for a chance to turn the Morris men out. Their rallying cry is the Grabbers must go.

What is the matter with the water-supply? How was it there was a delay on Sunday night in getting the water on to the fire in the East End. We were under the impression that under the new arrangements that when a fire occurred at either end of the city there would always be an ample supply of water at hand to cope with any ordinary conflagration without any delay. What is the trouble now? Should not the public be taken into the confidence of the authorities and the trouble ventilated and a remedy provided?

Again there is the trouble and expense thrown on householders who find their water service frozen up in consequence of water being turned off to concentrate the supply in the neighbourhood of a fire. These householders suffer for the public good. But surely the public generally who benefit should bear the cost of the proceedings, and the City Council should pay the plumbers' and other expenses entailed by the turning off of the water.

Like their fellows in Newfoundland the workers in the British Isles have the blessing of the ballot box, but they have not Manhood Suffrage as the workers have in Newfoundland. The Asquith Franchise Bill was introduced into Parliament to give them Manhood Suffrage. Owing to complications with Women Suffrage, the Government decided to withdraw it. But it cannot be delayed much longer.

When workers get Adult Suffrage then the problem of Poverty in the richest country in the world will be honestly tackled. Poverty of the workers is the blot which stains the escutcheon of England, and it is largely an inheritance from the past when wages and Unions were kept under by parliaments over which workers had no control.

Regret will be general that Mr. E. M. Jackman is constrained by the exigencies of his business to quit the political arena. Mr. Jackman is a formidable political gladiator, and the District of Placentia & St. Mary's will miss him. However, the hour brings the man, and another Liberal leader for that District will be found, who will be heartened on by the fights Mr. Jackman put up in the past.

Elsewhere in this issue will be found copies of the correspondence which passed between Sir Robert Bond and Mr. Jackman. A perusal of that correspondence will show that private and business reasons are solely the cause of the withdrawal of Mr. Jackman from politics for a few years.

We have been in close touch with Mr. Jackman up to the time of writing, and we know from his conversation and acts, that he is as full of sympathy with the Liberal Party as ever, and that it is with the greatest reluctance that he feels compelled to retire from active politics. Not only is Mr. Jackman in hearty sympathy with the Liberal Party, but he is a strong supporter of the Fishermen's Protective Union, and is and has always been most insistent on the Liberal Party and the F.P.U. working together in the closest unity for a common purpose. We regret that circumstances of a business character entirely unconnected with the policy of the Liberal Party and the policy of the F.P.U., have arisen, which constrain Mr. Jackman to arrive at the decision he set forth in the correspondence which we publish, and we cordially endorse the expression of opinion given by Sir Robert Bond of the loss the Legislature will sustain the next few years. Sir Robert Bond says: "I think you have decided wisely and in the best interests of your family." We think so too, and we know that Mr. Jackman has done it with the utmost reluctance and with the greatest regret. We may add that Mr. Jackman has fully and frankly discussed the situation as it affects himself and his business, with us, a number of times during the past few weeks. We wish him well, and hope that his honorable ambition will be attained, that the retirement will not be for long, and that the not distant future may hold out for him a chance to show himself an active Liberal gladiator once more.
