EDMONTON, March 17.  
A general election for Alberta will  
be held in May.

WASHINGTON, March 17.  
President Wilson, to-day issued a  
formal proclamation, convening Con-  
gress in an extra session at noon on  
April 7th.

RAPID CITY, March 17.  
A man named Perry, with his wife,  
three daughters and a son, were found  
frozen to death on the Elder Divide,  
east of here, to-day.

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 17.  
It is reported here that the Turkish  
troops found over four hundred frozen  
corpses of Bulgarian soldiers in the  
fields of Thrace.

er, to-day, the crew of 28 officers and  
men, of the German steamer Peruv-  
ian, of this port, perished when that  
vessel went down on an unknown  
date off the coast of Norway.

LONDON, March 17.  
At a weekly gathering of the suf-  
frettes in a Music Hall to-day  
shouts of "Why don't you blow up  
Premier Asquith and shoot him," rang  
through the hall, whilst Mrs. Pank-  
hurst was speaking. After referring  
to her approaching commitment to jail  
in connection with the burning of  
Lloyd George's house, she said that  
she had a letter from her daughter  
telling of what she was doing against  
her punishment. She says she is try-  
ing to release herself as a prisoner of  
war from the enemy, and ending all  
he tortures of imprisonment and soli-  
tary confinement.

NEUCHÂTEL, Switzerland,  
March 17.  
Panic has broken out among the  
inhabitants of the village of Flour-  
er, lying near Lake Neuchâtel, be-  
cause the top of Mount Marolli is  
sliding slowly downward, threaten-  
ing to overwhelm the place. The  
mass is moving at the rate of 8 or 9  
inches an hour, and there is imminent  
danger of an accelerated speed in its  
descent. Most of the people have  
moved their belongings to the sides  
of the neighboring hills, where they  
remain in the open in terror. A sim-  
ilar movement on Mount Carlini be-  
gan in 1889, but ceased in a few  
hours.

BERLIN, March 17.  
The European Powers, will, toward  
the end of the week, inform the Bal-  
kan Allies that the terms suggested  
by them as a basis for negotiations  
with Turkey, are inadmissible; and  
that the European nations will de-  
cline to submit them to Turkey. The  
draft of a note drawn up by the Am-  
bassadorial Conference in London at  
their last session, is being considered  
by the German Foreign Office, as well  
as at other European capitals, and is  
to be handed to the Allies after it has  
been approved by a further Confer-  
ence in London on Wednesday. The  
note will suggest that a modification  
of the demands of the Allies is indis-  
pensable. Both here and in London  
the necessity for the conclusion of  
peace is strongly urged.
