Cable News.

LAMBERG, Oct. 13.
Sixteen were crushed to death and many injured in a panic in the crowded synagogue at Choderow, Galicia, on Saturday.

MONTREAL, Oct. 13.
One of the rescue vessels states that 40 men were killed by the explosion. Capt. Inch is reported wounded. He is on the Kronland.

EDMONTON, Oct. 13.
The Hudson Bay Company tug Primrose, of Lake Athabasca, is believed to have foundered with all on board, numbering 16. She left Chipewyan Sept. 17th with two laden scows on a four days' trip, and has not since been heard of.

LONDON, Oct. 13.
The British cruiser Donegal has been despatched from the West Coast of Scotland to destroy the blazing Volturino. The Uranium Line has arranged to send the survivors to their destination in other vessels as soon as possible. All the cabin passengers were saved.

LONDON, Oct. 13.
The Saturday Review, Unionist, states that Churchill and F. E. Smith had arranged beforehand for Churchill to throw out the suggestion at Dundee, to exclude Northeast Ulster, a proposal that all parties repudiate. The intimate relations between these two nominal opponents has excited distrust among both Conservatives and Liberals, the latter resenting that a minister should have a Conservative leader as a confidant. Both are extremely clever, and it is thought are considering the formation of a central party. The unanimous Liberal feeling is that if the Conservatives have any compromise proposal to make, it should be made on a public platform, and that no compromise can be considered which divides Ireland or rejects Home Rule.
