Hope From Russia.

Russia is the country of surprises to-day, and among the greatest and most welcome of these is the sudden and complete collapse of the Korniloff rebellion. A few days ago the situation was extremely serious. Petrograd faced the double menace of the German advance and of no less an enemy than one who had lately been the Russian commander in chief. His humiliating failure has exhibited the complete ascendancy of the Provisional Government over the reactionary and anarchistic elements, and the exhibition will increase it further. The confederates will receive little mercy: the Government will show itself unrelentingly weak and omit a fine opportunity to restore order if it lets them escape with their lives. What appeared a few days back to be a grave peril may now be turned into an occasion of unmitigated good.

But the episode (for it has been little else), like so many late events in that country, is of greatest significance as an indication of Germany's present weakness. The revolt, it is said, left the Russian army for three days leaderless and without defence. Germany would not fail to seize so rare an opening, but there is no evidence that she has done so. On the contrary, the official bulletin from Petrograd speaks of fighting east of Riga in which the Russians have assumed the offensive, while Berlin claims no advance anywhere. None has been made, because there are no men to make it. Most observers regard the capture of Riga as far less military than political, designed for the benefit, not of the military position, but of the unsatisfied German populace, to whom it has been represented as a long step nearer peace. It could have been effected months ago, and would have been if it had offered military prospects worth while. Now, with winter approaching and the furious struggle in the Isonzo draining the East front of her men, Germany will find in Riga another mockery, another disillusionment. If the winter not only halts the invaders but allows the leaders of Russia to consummate the unification of the country, already happily manifesting its beginnings, our great eastern ally will yet do what she has been potent to do from the first, and grind into the dust the last resistance of the enfeebled and exhausted foe.
