VICTORY FOR CZECH-SLOVAKS. WASHINGTON, July 30.

The capture by Czecho-Slovak forces of several cities in the Caucasus and a Black Sea port where two Russian warships were seized and a steamer sunk, is reported in the Austrian semi-official newspaper Reichspost, according to information received by the Czecho-Slovak National Council here to-day. The warship guns were turned against the port of Nororosik where they were seized, the newspaper said, but no details as to the damge done were given. Cities captured include Staoroper, Sirjobriation and Michelovka while it was said that the Czech-Slovaks operating with the Russian White Guards, had occupied

WANTS MORE AIRPLANES.

WASHINGTON, July 30.

Secretary Baker announced to-night that General Pershing had requested the immediate shipment of a large number of airships and bombing planes for the use of the American forces, and that the order has been placed on the department's priority list insuring prompt transportation.

BRITISH OFFICIAL. LONDON, July 30. (Official.) During the latter part of the night natrols of the Australian division who w had entered German positions about Merris successfully established themselves east of the village which they surrounded and captured. One hundred and sixty-nine prisoners and a number of trench mortars and machine guns were taken by us in the course of this enterprise. Our casualties were light.
